..\*NOMINATIONS.—A meeting of the Liberal Electors of Easter Kings was held Monday, August 9th at which Messrs W. J. Brennan and John Ryan were nominated as Candidates for the Local House.\*

..\*MEETING AT SOURIS.—A meeting of the Liberal (Conservative Association of King's County), was held in the Court House at Souris yesterday. Mr. C. H. Storns was chairman. Mr. John McLean was the first speaker. In an able speech he gave a detailed review of the last three and a half years' of Conservative rule, showing the improvement in public works, the added inducements to teachers to stay at home, the building of a new sanitarium, better board in the Asylum, better roads, and demonstrated the increased prosperity of the Island. He also showed that it was a delegation from the Mathieson Government, and not Mr. Hughes, who had gained the \$100,000 increase in subsidy. He also said that it needed no demonstration to show that the car ferry was not a candidate for nomination, but was a great boon to the people of P. E. I. In conclusion he announced that he was a candidate for the local House. Mr. A. L. Fraser was the next speaker and spoke in an optimistic vein of the successful rule of the Conservatives. He said that farmers would soon be able to ship produce at the nearest station and it would be able to go to its destination whether in U. S. A. or Canada without breaking bulk. Mr. Fraser was followed by Mr. John Kichikam, who offered himself as a candidate for nomination. There were several other speakers. After the speeches Mr. John McLean was unanimously elected. Mr. John Kichikam was then proposed as a candidate, also Dr. A. A. McDonald. The matter was then put to a ballot and the result of the ballot was the election of Dr. A. A. McDonald by a large majority. Dr. McDonald thanked his supporters and stated that he would do his best as their representative if he was elected. After able orations by Mr. Alex. Bruce, and Andrew Mooney, the meeting closed.\*

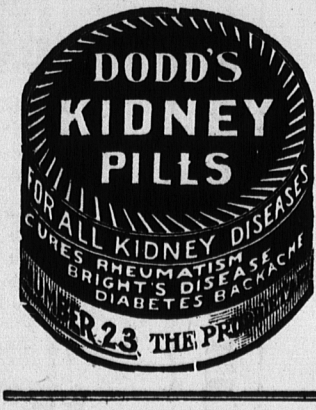

### WATCHED FOR FURIOUS FIGHTING IN DARDANELLES.

MONTREAL, August 10.—When the Canadian Pacific steamship Montreal came into port yesterday, she brought with her men who spent twelve days in May and June watching the most engrossing of all the struggles now being waged between the Allies and their enemies—the conflict of the Dardanelles. The Montreal herself was there, just outside the range of fire from the shore batteries for the most part, but she took her chance in May and June when she put the Derbyshire Yeomanry ashore. Luckily no shells dropped nearer here than one-quarter of a mile away, according to a man who had been on duty a later period.

The Montreal was stationed for a time next to the Queen Elizabeth, and the men became used to the singing of the monster shells sent over sea and land to some point where the enemy was preparing or dealing out trouble for the allied forces.

..\*On one occasion expressed it, "We could hear the shells singing as it went over the land, and it seemed to change the tone with each peak that it crossed until the missile found its mark, and then, instead of the singing sound, there was a convulsion of nature, everything seemed to go up, the trees, rocks, everything." Talking to some German prisoners taken in the land fighting, one of the Montreal men was told that they would never have believed that any troops in the world could have landed in the face of the preparations made for them. They were generous enough to say that only British troops could have done it, and this in spite of the fact that they were sore over the fact that Great Britain had gone into the war at all. They thought she had no business to go into it, and they had never expressed it of her.

Next to the Montreal was a ship with her masts cut away, and from this ship every day an officer went up into the air in a captive balloon a mile, less one more, according to the exigencies of the situation. From there he directed the fire of the war vessels, and he was far enough away to be beyond reach of shore guns. Some of the forts destroyed by the British could not be recognized as having ever had an existence as forts. One such fort destroyed by a French vessel was only a heap of debris with its guns sticking out at the top of the heap and pointing straight heavenwards.

At Alexandria the Montreal found that the German hospital and houses which had formerly heard little of any language but German now heard scarcely anything but English. The German hospital, with many of the big buildings along the waterfront have been converted into temporary hospitals as well. Turks were plentiful before the war, but not one can now be found anywhere in Egypt except in the barracks. The Germans were all taken to Malta.

The war is popular with Egyptians, and on every hand they speak disparagingly of the Germans, whose designs on Egypt they have not failed to plumb. The story is told there, and has been published, that the Kaiser gave a high military decoration to a Turkish general for having taken the Suez Canal.

Wounded Australians and New Zealanders at Malta and Alexandria said that the tales of the Turkish bravery were untrue, and that when they saw the allied troops approaching at a charge, they would have thrown away their arms, and fall down on their knees, crying, "Allah, Allah, Allah," and begging for mercy. They said that the Turks seemed to be good fighters as long as they were hidden away, but when they had to stand the shock of a charge, if they were not scourged at the slightest sign of reluctance by their German officers, the Antipodeans did not believe that the Turks would have fought for a day.

### MOVING PICTURE RECORD OF WAR.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—By the authority of the War Office, arrangements have just been completed for taking a complete moving picture record of events of the war in the British lines, both at the front and along the lines of communication.

The leading film producers and exhibitors, it is announced, have been brought into a co-operative scheme so that no single firm shall have a monopoly of the pictures. The first photographs will be taken in about a week. One complete set of pictures will be retained by the War Office for historical records and instruction. This set will eventually be placed in the British Museum. The Board of Education is expected to co-operate in a scheme for the use of the films in the public schools.

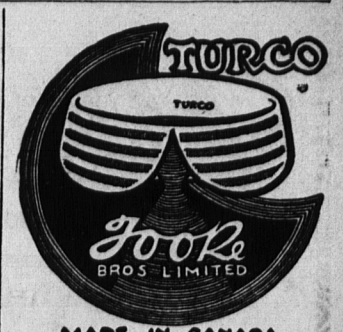
wondered why the Turks stayed so long by guns which had come under a murderous fire. Sometimes they had stayed by such guns even when the carriages were blown to pieces. Later on it was discovered that the Ottoman gunners were lashed to the limbers to prevent them running away. The feeling in the air among all the fighters on the Gallipoli Peninsula was that the Allies had a tough job, but that it was far from being beyond them. They were not only fighting the Turks in the trenches, but they were slowly throttling them by stopping supplies from the land, and by war, by means of the allied submarines in the Sea of Marmora.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—For more than five days John Hughes went to work, met his friends and was with his family without knowing his neck was broken and that he was near death. He complained of a slight pain in his neck, but did not think it worth while to see a physician.

When about to sit down at the breakfast table in his home in Brooklyn Wednesday, something snapped and he fell to the floor unconscious. Dr. Ramsey was called from the Kings County Hospital and he said the young man's neck was broken.

While swimming in Long Branch Saturday he dived from a jetty and his head hit a log. He was dazed for a few minutes, and following that felt the pain in his neck.
