The str. Amelia arrived safely at the Magdalen and landed her passengers. Crates and boxes are being made to receive herring for the Souris freezer.

It is very quiet in Souris at present, owing to the impassible condition of the roads.

A meeting of the Maple Leaf Farmers' Institute will be held in Summersville school on Tuesday, May 1st, at 7 o'clock.

A gasoline engine has arrived at Souris, and is being installed in the new launch, and she will be soon ready for her trial spin.

The casings and coverings which were on the stone work of the new Souris post office has been removed, and the masons have resumed work.

EWEN McDUGALL will preach (D. V.) in the Presbyterian churches, Souris and Bay Fortune, on Sunday April 29th at the usual hours.

The injury received by Leander Paquet while at work in his factory at Souris a few days ago, has turned out to be not so serious as was at first thought.

There will be a monster Temperance meeting in the Public Hall at Cardigan next Thursday evening at 7.30 o'clock. A number of prominent temperance workers are expected to speak. Don't fail to come.

Lobster fishing has begun in earnest at Souris, some boats having as much as six or seven hundred pounds, and some of their traps are being baited with salt herring. Herring in small quantities are being taken along the shore.

The sch. Mary N. Pike, which is ashore on East Point reef, report says, is breaking up, and will become a total wreck. She had about six hundred bags of salt and was bound for the Magdalen for a load of herring.

In to-day's Magazine Guardian is concluded the story, begun last Saturday of the pilgrimage, made in the year 1811, by two settlers of New Perth, with their wives carrying children in arms to Charlottetown to be baptized. It makes interesting reading.

ABOUT fourteen sail of vessels arrived at Souris yesterday evening, all bound for the Magdalen for herring. They report Pleasant Bay, N. S., blocked with ice, and eight or ten sail jammed in. Quite a number are outside the sho, waiting to get in and receive the bait.
