EGYPT GETS WARNING FROM THE BRITISH GOVT. THAT CANNOT BE MISUNDERSTOOD

CAIRO, July 25.—The British government, through Lord Allenby, high commissioner to Egypt, has addressed a strong note to the Egyptian government stating that the British government is most alarmed at the frequent outrages against British officials, officers and soldiers.

They note with dismay that the Egyptian government has failed to punish the perpetrators, and it also warns the Egyptian government that if the outrages continue, the British government will be compelled to reconsider its attitude towards Egypt.

There is no mistaking what the note means. It is a warning that if Egypt is unable to protect the subjects of foreign powers, Great Britain will intervene to ensure that protection at the cost of Egypt or disappointed political ambitions.

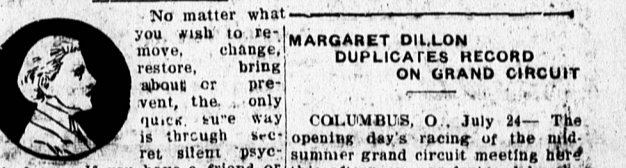
