**PARIS, Aug. 31.**— The "oldest poilu" of the great war, Monsieur Surque, Mayor of Auxerre, in Burgundy, has just died. He was 75 years old when the mobilization call came early in August of 1914. Far beyond the military age, the rugged old mayor signed up as a volunteer, and by dint of bluffing cajoling and threatening the army doctors, finally got himself accepted for the service. And he didn't have any rear-sinewer, either. From 1914 until early 1919 he did the work of a private, then of a corporal and sergeant in a fighting unit, and went over the top with all the rest of the bright young men. He had a great civic reception in 1919 at Auxerre, when covered with mud and glory, he marched into his neglected town hall, displaying his Croix de Guerre, Médaille Militaire, and Legion of Honor. Latterly the old "dean of the poilus," as the French refer to him, removed to Paris. But the flat air of the capital proved more detrimental to his robust old frame than the snow of Douaumont or the maelstrom of the Marne. He died at the age of 82 the grand old man has finally been gathered to his lost comrades of the war.

**Waiting For Premier Meighen's Announcement**

OTTAWA, Aug. 31.— Much interest is being shown in political circles here by the announcement made by Premier Meighen and Hon. Arthur Meighen at his meeting in London, Ontario on Sept. 1st. The Prime Minister leaves for London tonight and on his way home will spend Friday in Toronto where he is to deliver an address at the exhibition. Discussion on the possibilities of Mr. Meighen's London speech is plentiful. It generally is felt, however, that his announcement is not to be that of an immediate election.

**Martial Law Threatens Strikers**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.— President Harding signed today a proclamation calling the disorderly elements in the mining districts of West Virginia to disperse and return to their homes by Sept. 1st, noon.

The administration officials emphasized that unless there was prompt compliance with the proclamation, martial law would be declared.
