

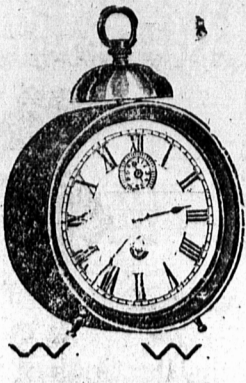

The Amherst News says that two Hewson Woolen Mills travellers, O. Thompson and A. Barwell, have been in town for a day or two on their way from New Brunswick, which ground they have been working since the first of the year. They report a good demand for Hewson Tweeds and Knit goods. The latter is being well received by those who bought it last year, which indicates that "Hewson Unshrinkable" is pleasing the people. In Prince Edward Island Hewson Tweeds are in constantly increasing demand. They are being worn by many of the most prominent people. The popular representative C. O. Thompson is expected to arrive in Charlottetown today on his usual business trip.

A Calgary newspaper received by The Guardian contains an account of a case of robbery, tried recently in Calgary in which E. Ryan, well known in Charlottetown, where he studied and practiced law appeared for the defence. The counsel for the prosecution made a strong case against the prisoners, placing all the evidence before them and reviewing the case thoroughly. On the other hand, Mr. Ryan in his address to the jury made a very able speech, pointing out how nothing definite was known, and that the whole case was all built on circumstantial evidence and the identification made by Henry Smith, who claimed he was robbed. Mr. Ryan stated that while he was doubting Smith's evidence, there was a large room for the doubt, owing to the suddenness of the whole affair and the darkness of the night, and that he thought the prisoners should have the benefit of any doubt. After being out for twelve minutes, the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty, and his lordship dismissed the prisoners.

The Province, a newspaper published in Vancouver, contains in a recent issue an account of a shooting affair which it describes as follows: "Police Officer Malcolm A. McLeod was shot by a Chinese chicken thief at 5:30 o'clock today morning, and is now lying in the General Hospital in a serious condition. The man who did the shooting escaped with a handcuff dangling from his wrist. Late today the handcuff was found near Cook & Tait's mill on False Creek. It had not been filed off, for the Chinaman had evidently slipped it over his wrist. The shooting occurred when the police were making a search of Charlottetown for chicken thieves, who have been operating in the central districts of the city and who had been traced in the snow early yesterday morning to that quarter. The searching party consisted of twenty men and was in charge of Inspector Mulhern. Every house was searched from cellar to garret, and in some instances the officers met with resistance, which was promptly overcome. The Chinese in some instances keep their chickens on the roofs, so that the work of the officers was not without difficulty. About 5 o'clock two men were seen coming out of a house carrying bags. They were closely watched as they made their way towards Homer street, the district where many chicken coops have been robbed of late. Officer McLeod was amongst the officers who were detailed to look after them. He was walking along the C. P. R. tracks between Hastings and Pender half an hour later, when he saw the men returning with the bags filled. Lying in wait behind some lumber he sprang at his men as they came opposite him. One of them dropped his bag and ran and was lost in the darkness. The other was captured and the officer fixed the handcuff on his left wrist, leaving the other end of it loose so as to lead his man to the station. Without a moment's warning the chicken thief with his free hand took a revolver from his pocket and shot the officer. The bullet entered McLeod's chin and went down into his right shoulder, where it lodged. It was afterwards removed. The police officer referred to is a son of Wm. McLeod, of Hartsville in this Province.
