FASCISTI HELP GUARD REMAINS OF VALENTINO 50,000 Block Broadway In Rush to View Body—Scores Injured.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—The body of Rudolph Valentino, great lover of the screen, today was guarded by police and black-shirted Fascists, because of the unprecedented and uncontrollable mob that have thronged to view it, resulting in scores of injuries.

Valentino is receiving more newspaper space than Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard University, and often referred as "the first citizen" of the United States, who is being buried at Cambridge, Mass., today.

Police estimated that 50,000 persons, mostly women and girls, blocked upper Broadway before the undertaking establishment where Valentino lies in state, and that more than 100 were injured in yesterday's crush.

High Commissioner Sails For Canada September 10th

Information on Which Doucet Banned His Charges

PROPER MATTER FOR INVESTIGATION, R. L. CALDER, K. C. TELLS COMMISSION LONDON, Aug. 26.—A. J. Doucet, former Conservative member of Parliament for Kent, N. B., told Sir Francis Lemieux yesterday that he had had from the public platform in regard to the charges of the Marquet and why he had said it, had made his references to the cruise of the Marquet in two speeches at Saint John and Bridgewater when accompanying Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Prime Minister, on his Maritime Province tour, he said.

"As far as I can remember, I said in Saint John that the Marquet was taken off her course to Three Rivers where she took Hon. Jacques Bureau and a party of officers on board," he said. "That she then called at Quebec and there took Hon. Ernest Lapointe on board." He had said, Mr. Doucet informed the commissioner, that the vessel had visited the Magdalen Islands at other points during which time the coasts which she should have been patrolling were unprotected.

Spain Wants Tangier

(Special to the Guardian) PARIS, Aug. 26.—The French Govt. has received a memorandum from Spain expressing the desire of that country that the international district of Tangier be attached to the Spanish zone in Morocco. It is generally conceded that France's reply will be an absolute refusal.

FORTY MINERS ENTOMBED BY EXPLOSION

Rescuers Succeeded in Bringing Out Four Bodies—Deadly Gases Prevented Further Rescue Work

(Canadian Press) CLEVELAND, Aug. 26.—A terrific explosion swept through the Cuyahoga No. 1 mine of the Clearfield Company here this afternoon claiming the lives of at least six miners, causing serious injuries to four others and entombing forty whose fate had not been determined tonight.

8th Anniversary of "Hardest Battle" in History

Miners Wives to Collect Funds in Russia

Cook, wife of the Secretary of the National Miners' Federation, will leave for Moscow tomorrow to collect funds in aid of the miners' wives and children. The Russian trades union will make a speaking tour of Russia, similar to that in the United States under Ben Tillett and Miss Ellen Wilkinson.

MACKENZIE KING KNEW OR SHOULD HAVE KNOWN

Flow of Smuggled Liquor Into Nova Scotia Cannot Be Checked Under Present System, Halifax Collector Tells Commission.

HALIFAX, Aug. 26.—Startling admissions of the inability of the Customs forces of this Province to effectively cope with the liquor smuggling, traffic under the system at present in vogue, alarming disclosures of the menacing growth of this illicit business in Nova Scotia, and suggestions, designed to make for more effective enforcement of the revenue laws, were contained in a report presented by William Acker, Customs Collector for the Port of Halifax, before the Commission investigating the administration of the Canadian Customs Department, when the sittings of this body were resumed in the Legislative Council chamber yesterday.

Gen. Condylis Succeeds in Forming Cabinet

(Special to the Guardian) ATHENS, Aug. 26.—Gen. Condylis who led Sunday's revolution which removed Gen. Pangalos from power succeeded today in forming a cabinet. An attempt to liberate Gen. Theodoros Pangalos failed today and Pangalos was transferred from the island of Aegina, to the prison fortress of Izebelon on the island of Crete where the inhabitants were anti-Pangalos.

Wreckage Believed To Be From Missing Schooner

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, Aug. 26.—Messages reaching this city tonight confirmed fears current during the past fortnight that the Laffave Schooner "Sable A Knickle" had been lost with her entire crew of twenty-two Nova Scotian fishermen. The messages came from the Department of Fisheries patrol cruiser "Arlieux," which was dispatched to Sable Island from Halifax yesterday with orders to identify wreckage believed to be from the missing schooner.

Human Fly Performs

At least a thousand people last night watched Jerry Hudson's "human fly" climb the five storey Telephone Office building on Queen Street, by scaling the outside with Hudson's performance, which did not take place until after dark, occupied only a few minutes nearly completed, practice, and he had reached the roof of the building almost before the crowd realized it. UNITED MINE WORKERS CARRY OUT THREAT

They Refused to Go Down Into the Pits Until Every Man Was Proven a Member of the U.M.W.A.
