**Halifax Views**  
**On Potato Prices**

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 6.—Halifax men, who are in close touch with the Prince Edward Island potato market expect a considerable slump in prices. Ten days ago the farmers and the dealers on the island were holding firm at a price of \$2.00 per bag of ninety pounds delivered at Halifax. Now their price has dropped and they are giving quotations of \$1.75 and in some instances an even lower figure has been given.

For several weeks Prince Edward Island was overrun with buyers for the American market. The presence of so many buyers stiffened the price and farmers who had storage facilities refused to sell their crops, after considerable quantities had been purchased it was discovered that a car shortage made it impossible to get the potatoes to the United States before November 15, the date on which shipment of potatoes in ordinary box cars stops. Because of this the American buyers have left the Island and fear is expressed that the bottom will go completely out of the market, which will throw large quantities on the local dealers at a price considerably lower than has yet existed this season.

**RE-EDUCATED SOLDIER WOULD BE MISSIONARY**

French Canadian Educated in The M.H.C. Vocational Classes Would Bring His People Up To Date.

Pte. A. Goulet came to the colors from a village on the Gaspé peninsula, a crusader for civilization from a little bit of old France preserved for a hundred years in isolation. He fought in Flanders and in the battle of the Somme lost an arm, but not his courage.

To-day he is one of the busiest men in the Orthopaedic Hospital in Toronto, where he is receiving treatment and getting an education, learning which he hopes to use in bringing his backward community up to date.

With the ambition to become a missionary of modern business methods to the Gaspé villagers, upon whom Fortune smiles furtively only now and then, he has accomplished wonderful things. From a retiring little French Canadian who knew no English, he has become a lively talkative Tommy who makes friends with everyone when he isn't putting his newly acquired chirographic ability to rest.

His special aim is to become a foreman and clerk in a lumber camp which he regards as the best starting place for his work. To this end he is now taking a business course under the direction of the vocational training branch of the Military Hospitals Commission.

It is persistently rumored that they intend to take armed action to seize the supreme power. **VICTORY LOAN**  
**TERMS ANNOUNCE**

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 6.—Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, today announced the particulars and terms of Canada's Victory Loan, as follows: "Subscription books will be open on Monday, November 12th, for five, ten and twenty year bonds, dated 1st December, 1917. Interest payable half yearly, 1st June and 1st December. Bonds will be in denominations as low as \$50. The price of the new loan is to be par, 100 cents on the dollar, for 5 1/2 per cent. bonds, with the privilege of spreading the payment over a period of five months in monthly instalments.

In view of this privilege of spreading the payments and as a full six months interests will be paid the purchasers on 1st June, 1918, the bonus of interest thus allowed will reduce the price, so that the bonds yield the investors 5.61 per cent. on the twenty year bonds, 5.68 per cent. on the ten year bonds and 5.81 per cent. on the five year bonds. This loan will carry conversion privileges into future issues and will be free of any present or future Dominion taxes, including income tax.

**VETERANS TRAINED AS JEWELRY CRAFTSMEN**

Returned Soldiers To Be Used In Development of New Canadian Industry.

For returned soldiers who will be unable to return to heavy work because of disabilities which have impaired their health, the vocational training officers of the Military Hospitals Commission in Montreal have arranged a course in craft jewelry making, beaten brass and copper articles for which there is a ready sale, and good salaries to be earned in the making.
