ALASKAN BOUNDARY SURVEY COMPLETED.

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—The International survey party of ninety men employed by the United States and Canadian governments to complete the boundary survey between Alaska and Canada has returned from the far north and reported to the government today. The party was in charge of J. D. Craig, chief of the Canadian boundary survey, and Thomas Riggs, Jr., engineer in charge of the American Alaskan boundary survey.

The report that they have completed the survey to within thirty miles of the Arctic ocean. No white man has travelled over the route surveyed, but the engineers report that they found many friendly Indians and Eskimaux.
The survey has cost the two governments more than two million dollars and has been going on for fourteen years.

MANY CLERICS TAKE PENSION.

LISBON, Oct. 25.—The patriarch of Lisbon has sent to the Vatican a list of 2150 priests who are receiving a pension from the government and the names of 5800 who have refused this aid. Of the latter 2400 are destitute. The Vatican has decided to give the penniless a small, monthly allowance pending the possible conclusion of a better arrangement with the state. Those who accepted the pension contrary to the commands of their bishops will be excommunicated and their names erased from the registers of the Catholic clergy.

STATES SCORE

TOBACCO PLAN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Governor Dix was asked on Tuesday to have the Attorney General of Virginia, North and South Carolina in filing objections to the reorganization plan proposed by the American Tobacco Company. The request was made in a letter written to the Governor by Henry H. Hunter, director of independent tobacco interests.

In protest against the proposed dissolution plan of the American Tobacco Company, the Attorney General of all the States of Virginia, North and South Carolina, submitted their formal objections yesterday to the judgment of the United States Circuit Court. In behalf of these three States, the protest charges that the plan is a bold attempt to nullify the judgment of the United States Supreme Court and declares that the present status is more tolerable than the plan proposed.

"The plan turns loose no asset and no agency," the attorneys general set forth, "by which the American Tobacco Company now maintains its absolute dominion over the tobacco trade. Its avarice for power and its utter willingness to loosen its grip on the tobacco business is strikingly illustrated in its refusal to give up one of the least of its subsidiaries, R. P. Richardson, Jr., & Co., Inc., although that company has from the inception of this suit petitioned to be allowed to do an independent business."
