THANKSGIVING DAY.

Yesterday, Thanksgiving Day, was an occasion upon which the Canadian people had more occasion for devout gratitude to the Giver of all good than ever before. Our country is so large that different conditions affected the harvest in different parts, but despite some drawbacks the toil of the husbandman was generally well rewarded. The fisheries yielded well, and the mines of Canada were never before so productive. Canadian workshops and factories were probably never so busy or so prosperous. The trade of the country far surpassed all previous years in volume.

To the above-mentioned causes of gratitude we must add exemption from sweeping plagues or epidemics, from great calamities, from invasion and from internal disorder. Our people have enjoyed prosperity, peace and content, with justice and liberty, under equal laws and a government of their own choosing. What more could we ask? If for such blessings the people of Canada were not grateful to God they would be sadly forgetful of what becomes a nation of professed Christians. We believe that there is much sincere gratitude among the Canadian people and trust it was yesterday earnestly and devoutly expressed.

St. John has a newly formed association known as the Development Club which appears to be a great mystery to all but the initiated. It has the old Mechanics' Institute for its headquarters, and there the salaried secretary has palatial quarters. The club offers certain athletic, sporting and reading privileges to its present 500 members, but there is an impression that there is another and more important object behind. Rumor has it that all members are sworn to vote in elections as the majority may decide, and the membership, which it is thought may increase to one thousand, could in that case easily hold the balance between parties. The club excites great local interest.

The list of party candidates is very nearly full in all the constituencies, rendering it morally certain that very few returns will be made by acclamation. The names of only a few independents appear in the list before us, so that the rule will be straight party contests between Liberals and Conservatives. The number of so-called independents is much less than at the election of 1896. The latest full list, we have seen bearing date 13th October shows 175 Liberals, 165 Conservatives and 10 Independents nominated.

At the next session of the Ontario Legislature a bill will be introduced to regulate the manufacture and sale of patent medicines. It will propose that the manufacture of patent preparations within the province shall be limited to persons paying \$1,000 license and approved by an official to be appointed by the Government as Registrar of Proprietary Medicines. The bill will provide for an inspection to prevent the importation and indiscriminate sale of preparations dangerous to health or that may be used for criminal purposes, and also to prevent the appearance of obscene, nauseous, misleading, or other advertisements suggestive of criminal practices.

November 5th is the date fixed for the Paris Exposition to close. Down to October 13th about 50,000,000 tickets had been used.

Mr. Herman Cook, ex M. P., became alienated from the Liberal party which he supported for many years. The Libs said he was disgruntled because he did not get a Senatorship which he wanted. Mr. Cook replied that he might have had a Senatorship which was offered him by two agents of the government, but the price, \$10,000, was too great. This Sir Wilfrid Laurier most emphatically denies and further denies that any demand was ever made upon Mr. Cook, directly or indirectly by him, through an agent or otherwise, for any sum of money large or small, or for anything else. Clearly if any such proposal was made to Mr. Cook his first duty was to have exposed the crime and brought the would-be bribers to punishment. If his statement is true why has he concealed the nefarious transaction so long?

He leaves San Francisco about the 1st of next month for Albany, Western Australia. It is understood that the government of Australia asked the War Office to recommend an officer to this position and in consequence Mr. Beer received the appointment. The salary connected with Captain Beer's appointment is a liberal one, and he is to be congratulated upon his ability to fill such a responsible position.

Kruger Has Prepared to Give Up His Home and Country in the Face of Disaster.

LONDON, October 16.—The Telegraph's correspondent in Lorenzo Marques cables an interview had by him with ex-President Kruger's grandson, Eloff, who accompanies his grandfather to Europe. He said he did not think Kruger intended to return to South Africa. He did not suppose the British would allow him to land if he did return. He denied his grand father had gone on board the Dutch cruiser Gelderland, which does not sail before next Thursday. When he did embark he would do so openly, under the auspices of the governor of Lorenzo Marques.
