Inter-Hoop League Is Taking Shape

(By Allan Harvey Canadian Press Staff Writer)

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (CP)—An international professional league for basketball, modelled after the National Hockey League and including one Canadian club among 11 members, took official shape tonight at a meeting of the Basketball Association of America.

Blueprints for the league, which will open a 54-game schedule next Nov. 2, were drawn at a banquet meeting presided over by Maurice Podoloff of New Haven, Conn., president of the association.

Canada will be represented by a Toronto team directed by 28-year-old Ben Newman of St. Catharines, Ont., who guided Merriton, Ont. Hayes Wildcats to the Canadian senior title in 1944. The Toronto team, which will play home games in Maple Leaf Gardens, will consist of its first year principally of United States players.

The American teams will be New York Knickerbockers, directed by Ned Irish of Madison Square Gardens; Boston Celtics, Philadelphia Warriors, Cleveland Cavaliers, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Detroit Falcons, Chicago Atomies, St. Louis Bombers, and Providence Steamrollers.

At an executive meeting preceding the banquet, the new association formally adopted a constitution and drafted rules governing reserve lists, sale and loan of players and exhibition games. The league will have its own publicity department to correlate releases of individual teams and issue weekly statistics.

The teams tentatively were split into two divisions: Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington and Providence will play in the eastern division; St. Louis, Cleveland, Detroit and Chicago in the western. Toronto will play in the eastern division.

Arrangements can be made, with Pittsburgh probably in the west.

Franchises held by Indianapolis and Buffalo, N.Y., will not be operated this season.

Showdown For Baseball Guild Today

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 19 (AP)—The American Baseball Guild gets its first official showdown tomorrow in a proceeding unprecedented in baseball history—a collective bargaining election among Pittsburgh Pirates.

The election was ordered by the Pennsylvania Labor Relations Board—something the National Labor Relations Board refused to do—on the petition of Guild organizer Robert Murphy of Boston, who claims a majority of the Pirates players want the Guild for their bargaining agent.

A simple majority of the votes cast will decide whether the Guild will become the players' voice in all Charles and other contract matters.

Charles M. Chastler, regional director of the Board, commented: "The Guild is a majority of the majority choose the Guild. I will be certified within a week as the players' bargaining agent. That's the law and it's customary that such certification stand for a year."

Some Pirate players claimed Guild sentiment has cooled in the team since two abortive strikes in June and the recent sale of the club.

If the Guild succeeds here, its organizational drive undoubtedly will be stepped up among other major league players.
