**FEARLESS YANKS THROG RANKS OF AIRPLANE HEROES**

LONDON, Feb. 9.—A few nights ago four members of the Royal Horse Guards, all more than six feet in height, and built like Apollos, stood in the lobby of a London theatre between the acts. They resembled the Three Musketeers, and attracted attention because of their wonderful physique and splendid bearing. Near by stood three youngsters, none over five feet four, and none weighing more than 120 pounds. The Horse Guards, mere military ornaments, resembled battleships, the three youngsters, torpedo boats at least, such was the comment of persons who stood near by. The youngsters were airmen. An American, who had observed the six, said:—"The big fellows are all right, but give me those kids."

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—Militia orders issued by militia headquarters here contain a paragraph dealing with the procedure in the case of men erroneously arrested as defaulters under the Military Service Act. The paragraph states that men who have been apprehended as defaulters and taken on the strength of the C. E. F. shall on the production of satisfactory proof that they have complied with the Act, be struck off the strength as "erroneously ordered to report."

QUEBEC EXEMPTIONS. QUEBEC, Feb. 9.—Cases heard by the local exemption boards in connection with the M. S. A. total 33,938, and of these 30,535 exemptions have been granted, 2,811 of which were only temporary. Seven hundred and forty-four exemptions were refused. The military authorities have appealed in 10,718 cases so far and 294 of these men have appealed from the decision of exemption tribunals.

ENFORCEMENT OF M. S. A. LONDON, Ont., Feb. 9.—A radical change in the operation of the machinery attending the enforcement of the Military Service Act is to be effected here tomorrow. W. E. Wismer, the deputy registrar, will then take over the duties that have hitherto been performed by agricultural and military representatives.

LEFT WITHOUT AUTHORITY. LONDON, Ont., Feb. 9.—Sergeant Van Every of Galt, formerly of the 11th Battalion, is being held at divisional headquarters awaiting transportation to England under unusual circumstances. Van Every was wounded and sent to an English hospital, from which he discharged himself without formally. He stowed on a transport and reached home without trouble. Then he applied for a war service badge. The application was forwarded to Ottawa in good faith and this brought to light his departure from England. He will be court-martialed in England for desertion.

**Sheep Raising Discussed**

TORONTO, Feb. 9.—A convention of Dominion wide significance opened here yesterday, when delegates of wool growers from every province in the Dominion met to discuss the formation of a proposed national co-operative company of Canadian sheep raisers. The delegates will be in session three days when matters of vital interest to the wool growing industry will be discussed. A step of far-reaching importance was taken when the committee drew up a resolution recommending the sheep raisers to offer their wools need in Canada to the Canadian Government during the continuance of the war, so that the Canadian mills will be assured of adequate supplies of wool for war and other work. The wool men also decided to oppose the proposal recommending the export licenses granted them by the federal government. The committee appointed in connection with the formation of a company were: L. R. Richards, Alberta, chairman; F. N. Savoie, Quebec; A. Reek, New Brunswick; and P. E. L. Benson, Nova Scotia. George T. Fotheringham, Ontario; George Gordon, Manitoba; J. Follett, and J. D. Wilson, Saskatchewan; L. Harker, Alberta and George Hayes, British Columbia.

HUN SUBMARINE PROBABLY DESTROYED. (Special to the Guardian) LONDON, February 11.—The Sunday Times says: "It is finally established that the 'Tuscan' sank while an attempt was being made to tow her toward the Irish coast. The fact that no submarine attack was made either on her or on the towing boats is regarded as confirming the belief that the submarine was destroyed by convoying warships."

GERMAN PEACE TERMS LONDON, Jan. 31.—Germany, through her imperial chancellor, Count Von Hertling, and Austro-Hungary, through its foreign minister, Count Czernin, have made reply to the peace terms of the Allies and the United States, as recently enunciated by David Lloyd George, the British prime minister, and President Wilson. Although on some points, both Count Von Hertling and Count Czernin affect to see the possibility of coming into agreement with their enemies on minor points, the concrete bases essential to peace are declared to be unacceptable. The spokesmen for Germany was uncompromisingly hostile to a major part of the peace aims as put forward by President Wilson, treating scornfully in his address those upon which Germany could not come into accord. Count Czernin was more deliberate in his treatment of President Wilson's ideas, declaring the president's viewpoint, expressed in his latest address to Congress, showed that there was less incompatibility between Austria-Hungary and the United States than had seemed to be the case.
