Britain's Merchantmen

The shipyards of the Dominions and India are now organising the supply of cargo vessels for the Empire's merchant fleet. India, ancient builder of ships, is preparing to launch vessels equal to the best of the West. Hongkong has the best of the modern cargo carriers up to 5,000 tons: one of them, the Hongkong and Whampoa Dock Co., has just built not only the hull of a modern cargo boat but also her main propelling engines, the largest marine power unit which has come out of China.

Although South Africa has no real shipbuilding industry, Durban's well-equipped repairing yard and dry dock have built up a reputation for shipping goods round the Cape instead of through Suez. In the last eighteen months Australia has built up a reputation for shipbuilding resources. A new shipyard, employing 2,000 men, is being established at Whyalla, South Australia, to build up to 10,000 tons. The famous Cockatoo Island yard can build four ships at one time, while Mort's Dock, Sydney, can build up to 10,000 tons and several small vessels simultaneously. Both Port Adelaide and Williams-town, with experience of building ships, are still producing expert labour. The equipment of the Commonwealth to handle the engineering side of the work is shown by the orders to the value of £250,000 for marine propelling engines and auxiliary machinery recently placed in Queensland.

Canada has now more than doubled the 4,000 skilled workers employed before the war in her 40 shipbuilding yards. Contracts for 18 establishments, contracts for 18 merchant vessels, each of 9,300 tons carrying capacity have just been placed in the hands of the yard at Vancouver. It is expected that in about a year's time the first of them will be sent down the ways. These ships will be built together with the reservoir of tonnage in U. S. A., are an important addition, increasing month by month the Empire's fleet of Britain's own war time fleet of merchantmen.

Britain Defeats Germany's Export
 Germany's defeat in one field of the war effort is already decisive. The chemical industry of Great Britain shipped more of its exports overseas last year than in any period since the hectic years following the last war.

They have gone up by nearly 15,000,000 to about £25,000,000, the largest sum in any group of United Kingdom manufactures. Everywhere throughout the Empire and among the friendly neutrals, the demand for British goods has stepped in sometimes with two-edged effect, where supplies of heavy chemicals from Germany have been cut off. In Argentina, for example, she is selling more of a certain chemical than she can produce. The reason that other finished products in which the chemical is used are not being produced from Germany across the Atlantic.

There is, moreover, a good prospect that Britain will continue to lead in the production of high quality pharmaceuticals. In pharmaceuticals Britain, by twenty years ago, was producing all the demands from home and overseas; certain products are even cheaper to-day than they were during the war.

Seed Tests At Home For Germination
 All seed in Canada to be sold under grade must be tested and graded in the laboratories of the Plant Products Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture. As few testing in these laboratories has been discontinued, it is likely that more seeds will be tested at home, particularly for germination when the object is simply to determine if the seeds will grow satisfactorily. Whether the seed is tested at home or not it is to be sold by grade, it must of course be tested and graded by the Plant Products Division at the respective rates of fees for those services as laid down in the provisions of the Seeds Act.
