Odd Fellows Anniversary

The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs of this City were at home to their friends on Tuesday evening last, when they celebrated the birthday anniversary of the founder of their order, Thomas Wildey. There was a large attendance present and an enjoyable evening was spent. A short programme was carried out every number of which was much appreciated as was noted by the generous applause which was accorded performance. The day commemorated by the Odd Fellows at this time is known as "Wildey Day" and is a constitutional requirement for celebration. Thomas Wildey the founder was born in London, Eng., Jan. 15th, 1782, and died at Baltimore, Maryland, U.S.A., on Oct. 19th, 1861 in his 80th year. He had more than ordinary intelligence, although he had very little opportunity to obtain even a common school education. But he had other qualities that went far among the class of people with whom he labored, among which was a spirit of friendliness not often encountered among ordinary citizens. So, as would be supposed, when he came to work as a fraternalist among his chosen associates his labors were well rewarded. He emigrated to the United States in 1817 and immediately started research in the fraternal world, the result being the founding of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows now one of the largest orders of its kind in the world.
