RT. REV. MONSIGNOR MACLEAN - The poet who wrote that "Death should come gently to one of gentle mould" must indeed have had in mind one such as the kindly and well beloved servant of the Lord whom death summoned peacefully away from St. Mary's Parochial House, Souris, July eighth.

This venerable and distinguished Prelate was for almost half a century one of the most well-known personalities in the Province. Few personages throughout our fair Island could have been so esteemed and respected by so many people, in all walks of life, as was the dignified and saintly Father MacLean, and with his passing a dominant personality is removed from its earthly scene of activity.

Ordained to the Priesthood in the Basilica of Quebec, June 13, 1886, he was appointed assistant to his former Pastor and friends, Rev. Francis J. Macdonald, Curate at the old St. Dunstan's Cathedral for a short time, he became Pastor of East Point and St. Margaret's until 1890, when he returned to St. George's as Pastor until the death of Rev. Father Francis Macdonald, Pastor of Summerside for nineteen years, he was appointed to the pastoral charge of St. Mary's Church, Souris, in 1919. In all the various fields of activity success Rev. J. J. Whiten, Belvidere, Ill.; attended his every effort, and in Mrs. John Boyan, Rosedale; Lloyd, the temporal and spiritual, his various missions still bear the imprint of his rare and splendid gifts as a learned and zealous priest and as an administrator of unusual ability.

After the ceremony, the bridal party motored to the home of the bride, where a wedding breakfast was served to the immediate friends and relatives of the bride and groom, after which they left on a short honeymoon trip to the mainland.

An interesting visitor to Charlottetown yesterday was Mr. John J. Lightstone, of Outremont, Montreal. Mr. Lightstone has as his hobby the collecting, classifying, and assorting the historical significance of watches. His interest in horology arises out of his love for art, and the fact that it is today a lost art. All of the watches in his collection of over four hundred pieces have been made by hand. The horologist of those days was a master craftsman who spent many years as an apprentice before being allowed to join the watchmakers' guild. This guild, previous to 1630 was not distinct from that of the blacksmiths, but in that year Charles I granted them a separate charter.

The high regard the people of that time had for these geniuses is evident when it is recalled that two of their number, Thomas Thompson 1638-1730, and George Graham 1673-1751, are buried in Westminster Abbey.

Mr. Lightstone has been collecting rare specimens of their work for twenty-nine years, and claims to be the only authority in Canada on all branches of horology since the death of Mr. J. Sutcliffe Smith of St. Catharines, Ont. It is Mr. Lightstone's intention, when his collection is complete, to donate it to Canada if the Federal Government will open a Horological Museum.

While in Summerside recently, Mr. Lightstone obtained an exceedingly fine specimen of 18th century horology from Mr. H. R. Crockett made by Donald McIntosh of London, England. The entire balance plate is made of a single piece of gold beautifully decorated by the engraver's art. In Charlottetown he added another piece to his collection, an English verge, made by T. Jones, London, in 1679. This watch is driven by a chain so fine, the individual links can scarcely be discerned with the naked eye. This watch was obtained from W. N. Tanton's Mr. Lightstone was fortunate in discovering another verge at G. H. Taylor's. It was the work of A. Franklin, Liverpool, England. The decoration was put on by the fire gliding process which was the method used prior to our electroplating process. The balance plate of this watch is pierced by over 100 holes in a uniform pattern, and decorated in great detail. Another watch made by Riley & Son, England, had two diamond bearings for the delicate balance wheel and fourteen ruby bearings for the other gears. One of the watches in his collection is over 300 years old. It was made by Franz Tofepf Federmann, Kronban, Russia. It is the small-

est piece of work of its kind, and was made for the Czar. It has a solid gold movement and the case is exquisitely finished. On the back is the crest of the Royal House. Years were spent in the creation of this single specimen of the watchmaker's art.

SAD BEREAVEMENT - Much sympathy is extended to Mr. Herman Bryan of Conway in the death after a short illness of his eldest son, William, at the Prince County Hospital shortly after 11 o'clock Monday night. He was only twenty years of age and was a very bright and promising youth well beloved by a large circle of friends, who will be grieved to hear of his death when on the threshold of his career. Besides his parents one sister and one brother are left to mourn. The remains were conveyed to his home for burial on Tuesday. S.

THURSDAY - Word was received at St. Dunstan's University where the priests of the Diocese are on Retreat, that Rev. James J. Farrell, D.D., professor of English at St. Dunstan's, died yesterday morning at St. Mary's Hospital, Montreal. About three weeks ago Rev. Dr. Farrell was operated upon and has since been critically ill. Last Friday he seemed to rally and it was felt that the crisis had passed, but he unexpectedly suffered a relapse yesterday and died about 4.15 this morning. He was one of the most talented of the younger clergy of the Diocese and, after a brilliant scholastic record, won his Doctorate at Laval University two years ago. He was born at Iona Nov. 24, 1897, and was ordained at St. George's on June 28th, 1931. After serving at St. Dunstan's Basilica for a time he was appointed to the staff of the University and was an effective and beloved teacher.
