Appeal Of R. C. Auld Allowed In Supreme Court Of Canada

Word was received here today by Mr. W. E. Bentley, K.C., that the appeal of Robert C. Auld, defendant appellant, has been allowed, in the case of Austin A. Scales of Freetown, plaintiff, versus Robert C. Auld, defendant, also of Freetown. Mr. Bentley appeared for the appellant, Mr. H. F. MacPhee for the respondent. The case was one arising out of the interpretation of a lease from the plaintiff Scales to the defendant Auld, of premises adjoining the railway upon which the defendant had erected a warehouse for storing and shipping potatoes and an attempt by the plaintiff Scales to terminate the lease. The case has been before the Court for some considerable time. The question of law and equity involved were first tried by Chief Justice Campbell who gave judgment in favor of the plaintiff. An appeal was taken by the defendant Auld to the Supreme Court en banc of Prince Edward Island. Justices Arsenault and MacGuigan sitting at the Court of Appeal en banc, confirmed the Chief Justice's judgment and refused to allow the appeal, thus making the judgment of the full Court of this Province unanimous. Polish Veterans Have Complaints

HALIFAX, Oct. 7.—(CP)—Conditions under which they worked on farms at Lethbridge, Alta., were so intolerable that they decided to return to England four months after Canada's immigration scheme brought them to the Dominion, two Polish veterans testified in police court here today.

Boleslows Dzierzek and Kazimierz Tynohovich, who testified on their own behalf, had been charged with boarding the liner Aquitania Sept. 20 without permission.

Magistrate R. J. Flinn told the accused through an interpreter that he was "obliged to find them guilty" and sentenced them to six months each in city prison. He advised them to write to the Justice Department and ask that their sentences be remitted.
