Scientists Forsee Amazing New Weapons

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3—(AP)—Two leading specialists in the field of guided missiles said today it is necessary and "theoretically possible" to arm the United States with new weapons such as space ships or projectiles navigating themselves by stars.

Vast problems of propulsion, launching and guidance must be overcome through years of research before any such amazing weapons can be perfected, they said.

But Dr. Lawrence R. Hafstad and Dr. Daniel T. Sigley already are looking over the possibilities. National security dictates, they say, that these be explored "to the limit."

Hafstad is director of the Johns Hopkins University applied physics laboratory and Sigley a member of the staff.

Looking beyond recent "guide bombs" and the German V-2 type weapons, Hafstad said:

"We face a tough job... technical men with experience in the guided missile field, though confident of ultimate success, insist on talking in terms of years rather than months."

Both Hafstad and Sigley said researchers must even consider the possibility of projecting missiles beyond the influence of the earth and its atmosphere.

Amazing Possibilities

Sigley told a reporter that the following things are "theoretically possible" if scientists perfect the proper mechanisms of propulsion, launching and guidance in years to come.

1. "Satellite" vehicles or space ships, launched at speeds capable of getting them beyond the earth's gravitational pull and into an area where they would circle the earth like a celestial object—ready to zoom down and spread destruction at the bidding of men or robots directing them by remote control.

2. Missiles that would be self-guided by means of built-in telescopes and other instruments that would automatically track a course to an objective target by reference to the stars, the moon and the planets.

3. Projectiles which could be made to follow celestial "highways" made by the invisible lines of magnetic force which surround our planet.

4. Guided missiles that would "ride" a radar beam to a target. Or—if the target were beyond radar range—missiles that would follow a hyperbolic course computed automatically within the missile after it had passed the converging point of two radio waves at some point in the sky.

5. Missiles that would have built-in means of "homing" on a target, once they were guided to the general area. Such "homing" techniques, he said, conceivably could include television whereby the missile would head for a target as soon as it had televised an area exactly matching a picture of the area carried within the missile.

"It must be realized," he said, "that the push button war is definitely not just around the corner. At the same time, it would be a fatal mistake to prepare the United States for defense against the wrong kinds of weapons."

Dental Supplies Combine Alleged

OTTAWA, Sept. 3—(CP)—Justice Minister Ilesley announced today that investigation has uncovered a combine in the distribution, and sale of dental supplies in Canada, but the government has not yet decided to take any action.

Mr. Ilesley released a report by F. A. McGregor, commissioner of combines investigation, who said: "It is my opinion that a combine exists in the distribution and sale of dental supplies in Canada, within the meaning of the combines investigation act, and that all the members of the Canadian dental trade association have been parties and privy to this combine and have knowingly assisted in its formation or operation."

Mr. McGregor said the dealer members of the C. D. T. A. were the Ash-Temple Company, dental company of Canada, Dominion Dental Company and National Refining Company, all of Toronto, Maritime Dental supply of Halifax, British Columbia Dental Supply of Vancouver, and Paterson and Paterson Incorporated of Montreal.
