Through a misunderstanding the audience was denied the pleasure of solos which were to be rendered by the Misses Pierce, Cheverie, McDonald and Gardener. Before the close Mr. Pierce complimented Mr. and Mrs. A. McDonald on the success of their undertaking after the formalities were over, a bountiful supper was served at the close of which those who took part were grouped in a most artistic tableau which was very effective and concluded with the National Anthem.

REGISTRATION BUT NOT CONSCRIPTION OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—The government has under consideration a comprehensive scheme of public service to meet conditions arising out of the war. It is expected that an announcement will be made shortly. The two main considerations which have to be adequately dealt with are recruiting and labor. Recruiting has fallen off and there is a storage of labor. To fill up the ranks to the extent of providing the half million men Canada promised it is necessary to take steps different from those hitherto taken. But to do so without interfering with the other necessity, that of providing war supplies and munitions, as well as food and other supplies for the people is a problem which is taking the ingenuity of those responsible. It has been said in some quarters that Canada is on the eve of conscription, but although there is a call for it is which is becoming louder each day it is regarded as hardly possible for this country to adopt that solution of the difficulty.

FORESTRY BATTALION Now Recruiting HALIFAX, SEPT 14.—The 242nd Overseas Battalion (Foresters) which is now recruiting in the Maritime Provinces is the third Forestry Battalion formed in Canada. There are a good many Maritime Provinces men and the 238th. There was some doubt at one time whether the 242nd would be a Forestry Battalion or Pioneers, but it has been decided that they are to be Foresters. The 234nd is doing most of its work in the north of Scotland cutting Scotch pine. There is a company at work in the park at Windsor Castle cutting the trees there and a third company at New Forest. There is a party in camp near Dover and some men still at Bramshot. The 242nd Battalion will likely be sent to France. Lieut. Col. White was over the ground there and found a great deal of timber suitable for lumbering, so that it is likely, if not all, at least the majority of the men enlisting now will soon be laying low the trees in France. Eight saw-mills have been sent from Canada to England, six for the 24th Battalion and two for the Forestry committee in England, which has supervision over the lumbering operations there during the war. The portable mills are entirely new in the British Isles and their wonderful efficiency is said to be causing much interest. The 238th was very recently recruited chiefly in British Columbia and is said to be considerably over strength. These battalions have no delay about getting at their actual work. They are wanted in the forests of the Old Country at once. The Foresters start out with the same pay, separation allowance, pensions, etc., as other Overseas Battalions, but after arrival on the other side a certain number of men are selected for special positions as sawyers, setters, millwrights and mill saw filers. These men will receive from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per day—the lowest pay of a sawyer or millwright being \$2.50.

GERMANS ORDERED TO Take No Prisoners NEW YORK, September 14.—From official British sources the New York Times received yesterday the translation of a letter found on a German prisoner captured in the battle of the Somme. The prisoner, writing to his family in Stuttgart, said that the Germans had received orders "to take no prisoners, but to despatch them with the bayonet." With the translation came a photograph of the original letter, which was addressed to "Karl Koch, and family, Kallental, near Stuttgart." A part of the letter, as officially translated, follows:—"And now we had three days' rest and I could get nothing at all to drink except costly wine. It is very disagreeable to us that we are obliged to go through once again; you cannot conceive it. So many of our comrades are missing who are fallen or were wounded during the week, and now we are obliged to go through it once more. Oh dear me. Here we have proper Englishmen against us, and have orders to take no prisoners, but to despatch them with the bayonet, which I would not be sorry to do. But they are always getting more prisoners from us, and what do they do with them?"
