## Proof Established Of St. Peter's Tomb

VATICAN CITY, June 28—(Reu-  
ters)—Ten years of excavation  
has established proof that the tomb  
of Saint Peter is beneath the Ba-  
silica of Saint Peter's Cathedral, an  
official Vatican publication has  
disclosed.

An article by Giovanni Nicolosi  
in the Vatican Review Ecclesia,  
published Saturday, said discovery  
of a marble tablet with inscrip-  
tions confirmed the existence of  
Nero's circus under Saint Peter's.  
The article is the first official  
indication of the result of the  
lengthy excavations. The Pope is  
expected to make a full declara-  
tion on the subject during the holy  
year of 1950.

OTTAWA, June 27—(CP)—Sav-  
ings on deposit in Canada's char-  
tered banks at May 31 last amount-  
ed to \$4,338,865,000, against \$4-  
338,894,000 at April 30 and \$3,965-  
082,000 at May 31, 1948 the char-  
tered bank statement for May showed  
today.

Call loans in Canada amounted  
to \$74,179,000 at May 31, as against  
\$89,952,000 at April 30 and \$80-  
233,000 at May 31, 1948.
