Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE eight years old, family or male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency at certain conditions. Dunes—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, in certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Dunes Six months residence in each of three years after settling homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Dunes—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. G. Deputy the Minister of the Interior N.B.—Unauthorized publication of this advertisement will not be paid for.

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING OF WOOL

Within the past few years the sheep industry in the Dominion has advanced rapidly and is now assuming a position of real importance in Canadian agriculture. This progress has largely been due to the adoption of co-operative methods of marketing and buying.

The first systematic attempt to market wool co-operatively in Canada was made in 1912. The effort was successful and the movement spread to other parts of the Dominion. Last year there were associations organized in every province for this purpose. In Prince Edward Island sheep raisers have marketed their wool co-operatively for the past three years.

In every instance where co-operation in the marketing of wool has been practised it has brought higher financial returns to the wool grower, and has also greatly improved the quality of the clip placed on the market. In addition it has meant the raising of the level of prices to every producer, whether selling co-operatively or not, over the entire country.

These associations of sheep raisers organized in the different provinces realized that they were more or less duplicating efforts, that their sources of sale were common and that their interests were one. Consequently the necessity of a national organization, capable of operating as a business unit in all parts of Canada and elsewhere, where advantageous sales and purchasers might be made, became apparent.

As a result a conference of sheep raisers from every province in Canada was held at Toronto in February, 1918. At this convention it was agreed to form a Dominion wide organization, called the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Limited. Representatives from each province were appointed on the Board of Directors, Mr. W. H. McGregor, Central Lot 16, is the director for Prince Edward Island, and from him full information concerning the organization of the company may be had.

The objects of this company in general are to promote sheep production in Canada, and to encourage co-operation among farmers and breeders of sheep, with the special object of acting for farmers as the selling medium or agency for wool, breeding stock, sheep for slaughter, etc., and to purchase for them such supplies as the shepherd might require. It is the intention to attain these objects wherever possible through the local associations.

In Prince Edward Island grading stations will be established at Summerside and Charlottetown, as has been the case during the past two years. Sheep raisers will send their wool to these grading stations. Here it will be graded and after grading it will be marketed to the best advantage. The fact that the wool is graded gives the buyer full information as to the product offered; he knows exactly what he is getting and is willing to pay full value for it.

BRITISH SUCCESS IN GERMAN EAST AFRICA

LONDON, May 21—British troops, campaigning against the German East Africa forces have won another success, after heavy fighting and inflicting heavy losses on the Germans, it is officially announced.

The engagement began when a small body of British African riflemen surprised an important German camp and set the huts on fire. The Germans counter-attacked and the British force fell back, fighting heavily all day long. Before the day was over, however, the British rallied their forces and the fighting ended with the defeat of the Germans, who sustained heavy losses.

IN MEMORIAM

REV. D. B. McLEOD, M.A.

The death occurred in Charlottetown yesterday, after a short illness of Rev. D. B. McLeod, for many years the faithful and devoted pastor of Zion Church, in this city, but latterly of Upper Stewiacke, N. B. Coming to this province only a few weeks ago, accompanied by his wife, the deceased gentleman on arrival here, was too ill to be taken to his old home in Uigg, where it was hoped he would regain his health and passed away early yesterday morning, mourned by a grief-stricken wife and one daughter, Mrs. A. W. Wauchope, whose husband is Chaplain of the American forces at Camp Gordon, Georgia; four brothers, one in Uigg, and three in the United States, and one sister in Quincy, Mass. The late Mr. McLeod, who was born at Murray Harbor Road 64 years ago, after his pastorate in Zion Church, also had charges in Quincy and Somerville, Mass., and in Orwell in this province, and his death will be sincerely mourned both in this province and the several fields, where he so lovingly and faithfully carried on his ministry.
