## Foreign Missionary At St. Paul's

On Sunday last the members of St. Paul's parish, Summerside, were privileged to hear the Reverend Vincent Morrison, a missionary from China, speak at the three masses.

Father Morrison, who is a native of Savage Harbour, P.E.I., has spent the past eleven years as a missionary in the Prefecture of Lishui, Cheeking, in South Eastern China.

The district of Lishui was made a Prefecture in 1925 by the Holy See and given to the Canadian Missionaries from Scarborough, Ontario as their mission territory.

When Father Morrison went to Lishui in 1925, in company with Msgr. J. M. Fraser, they had only one more priest to assist them in their apostolic labor, in this pagan district of a million and a half people.

During the past eleven years however, the little China Mission Seminary at Scarborough (near Toronto) has been sending missionaries to the "field afar."

Now the Prefecture of Lishui has six regular parishes with churches, twenty eight mission chapels, two schools, a convent, and a dispensary conducted by seven nuns from Embroke, Ont. There are now three thousand Christians in this district, with twenty seven priests from Canada and Newfoundland. Msgr. William McGrath, who has several times visited the Island, is the supervisor of the Lishui district.

Father Morrison has seen a great deal of progress in his mission field since 1925, both spiritual and temporal.

Lishui is about six hundred miles southwest of that great metropolis of the Orient, Shanghai. In 1925 the journey from Shanghai to Lishui took two weeks, by boat and on foot. Now one can make the journey in two days by rail and bus.

On Monday morning the missionary addressed the pupils of St. Mary's Academy and told them many interesting things about the Chinese people and his work among them.

In the fall Fr. Morrison expects to return to China in company with eleven young Canadian priests who are also going as missionaries to Lishui.

An interesting fact about China is that she has twenty nine dioceses entirely in charge of 29 Chinese bishops and native clergy.—S.
