**TRINITY UNITED CHURCH**  
 The emphasis today is on Religious Education and the Conference held in our Church last week was a success from every stand-point. The bulleting committee have extended their thanks for the hearty co-operation in which its requests were met, the attendance throughout the conference was good, and the addresses given were of an inspiring nature and must result in more and better intensive work among young people.

A letter from the Moderator was read at the morning service in which the membership of the United Church of Canada are called to a fuller consecration and fervent prayer keeping in view the 100th Anniversary of Pentecost to take place in June, 1930. Let the theme of Rally Day, "In Quest of others" be the controlling purpose of all throughout the fall and winter months.

The morning service was in charge of Rev. Dr. Ramsay whose address was on "The Spirit of Worship." The service was broadcast by C. H. C. K. and it is understood the reception was very good. The Choir gave—the Anthem "Still, Still with thee" to music as composed by Professor Fletcher and with Miss Lillian McKennie taking the solo part. It was beautifully rendered. The junior congregation turned out in goodly numbers and the attendance at Sunday School was 325.

In the evening Rev. F. M. Milligan, travelling secretary of the Religious Education department of The United Church was the speaker, his subject being "The Appeal of the General Council." He took as his text, Matt. 16-18 "I say also unto thee, that thou art Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

Owing to the inclemency of the weather, the congregation was not as large as usual. The music by the Choir included a Solo by Mrs. W. E. Fletcher "Nearer, my God to Thee" and the Anthem "Saviour, Thy children keep."

After the service the young people gathered in large numbers in the Ladies' Parlor for the usual "Sing-Song and social talk around the home like grate fire."

 5. And what will these be? They will be the memories by which our names will be cherished—the kind inspirations that cheered many a weary way—the words of tenderness that came as value to the broken and bleeding hearts—the gracious influence that went from us like the refreshing fragrance of the rose, or the bracing zephyr of the sea. These will be the most important things, and these will live long after every book has perished, long after every permanent parchment shall have mouldered into decay, long after every old cloak has fallen beyond renewal or repair. Let us covet earnestly the best things—for "life is real, life is earnest, and the grave is not our goal—dust thou art to dust returned, was not spoken of the soul."

 Britain will continue to battle for the markets of the world.  
 Seventh. Latin-America as well as Latin countries in Europe, will adopt an attitude of reserve toward the Anglo-American understanding. All of these results are in the air now as a sort of romantic spell falls over official Washington and the imminence of the job ahead becomes defined. For having undertaken to secure the peace of the world, the British-American understanding, the machinery of the League of Nations, the Kellogg-Briand peace treaties and the agreements of Locarno, will move forward aggressively to make the anti-war movement something more than a general principle.

**MacDONALD PAYS TRIBUTE**  
 NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Tribute was paid here today by Prime Minister MacDonald to the devotion and zeal of two ambassadors—Sir Eame Howard, the British representative at Washington and Charles G. Daves the American spokesman at the Court of St. James. "I am here because he has been here," MacDonald said, in referring to Sir Eame in an address before English Societies, expressing regret that Sir Eame soon is to retire because of age. The Prime Minister said: "The quiet demeanor that he has shown in throw-

ing down barriers that had been erected against a good understanding between our two nations, his sweet reasonableness, never upset in stating his case, his geniality as a host, his devotion to the interests of which he has been properly the guardian have paved the way for the understanding between us that in the fullness of God's time, I hope is being brought about. Describing Daves as "a great ambassador," Mr. MacDonald said he was a bridge that the spirit of America makes in crossing the seas." He added that the appearance of General Daves face, at the threshold of his door had dispelled "the winter of my gloom."

Sometime during the night the special train will leave for Ottawa. Ottawa October 17.

In the capital, on Thursday the 17th, the British high commissioner will meet the train and conduct the British visitors to Rideau Hall, where they will be the guests of Lord and Lady Willingdon for four days. The only formal event of the day will be the government dinner in the Parliament buildings. The British premier and Canadian premier will foregather in the afternoon in Mr. MacKenzie King's country home at Longmeads, in the Gatineau hills. There will be a tea for Miss MacDonald at the May Court club in the afternoon. At dinner, to which the official life of Canada has been invited, Mr. MacDonald will deliver the principal address of his Canadian visit.

On Friday a luncheon will be given by Hon. E. B. Bennett at the Country club for Mr. MacDonald. At the same time Mrs. C. H. Thorburn will entertain in honor of Miss MacDonald. The United States minister, Hon. William Phillips and Mr. Phillips will entertain at tea. In the evening the governor-general and Lady Willingdon will give a dinner at Rideau hall for their guests.

On Saturday, a luncheon with the British high commissioner, tea with the Women's Canadian club and dinner at Laurier House with Premier Mackenzie King comprises the day's program. Sunday will be a free day. In the evening the party leaves for Montreal, where they will spend one day. Mr. MacDonald will speak before the Canadian club at noon and receive an honorary degree at McGill university in the afternoon. The British premier and Miss MacDonald will dine with Sir Henry and Lady Thornton. Later they will leave for Chicoutimi.

At Chicoutimi the party will be in the hands of Col. John Price, A. D. C. to the governor-general. They will lunch with Mr. J. E. A. Dubuc, M. P. They will spend two days in Chicoutimi and the surrounding country. On Thursday, Oct. 24, the party arrives in Quebec, where they will be met by Premier Taschereau and taken to government house. There will be a private luncheon for Mr. MacDonald at the Garrison club and an informal dinner at government house.

On Friday, the 25th, Mr. MacDonald will deliver his fourth and last address of the Canadian tour at a luncheon given under the joint auspices of the Men's and Women's Canadian clubs. During the afternoon, the whole party will embark on the Duchess of York, which sails for England that night.
