THE Methodist Year Book, just issued, gives the present membership of the Methodist Episcopal church, as 3,004,735, an increase of almost 30,000 over 1903. The value of the denomination is \$17,008,727. The year's gifts to the official benevolent objects totalled \$2,942,070.

IF THE Moncton Times will shortly be printed from a new web perfecting press with a speed of 4,000 copies an hour. The paper is to be enlarged and other improvements made. The Times people have also put in four monoline type-setting machines and in their new building, erected two years ago, expect to have "one of the most complete newspaper plants in the provinces."

In this its Jubilee year, the Ladies' College has very fittingly reached its culminating point as far as the number of boarders is concerned. Although eighteen did not return after Christmas, so many new ones have been coming that in a few days the number will foot up to 143, eight more than ever before and only six or seven short of the entire quota that can be accommodated in the college. Evidently no mistake was made in building the new cell—the mistake lay probably in not building two.—Sackville Post.

The Calgary City Council have asked for tenders to erect the huge municipal lighting plant. At the same time the City Solicitor rendered a decision that the obnoxious perpetual monopoly exerted with such irritating persistence by the Eau Claire Company is worthless, since the company has violated its agreement for years in various ways. This company is owned by a number of American capitalists at Eau Claire, Wis. By some manner they secured an enormous perpetual concession from the Dominion. This decision of the solicitor will force them to remove their poles and wires from the streets. The attitude of the Eau Claire monopolists has stirred up the people so that when the municipal plant proposed was voted on it was carried by 29 to 1.

THE annual report of the Indian Department for the year ending June 30 last has been distributed. The Deputy Superintendent General in his report to the Minister says that the country has no little reason to congratulate itself upon a policy, which every organ of the aboriginal population into a law respecting, prosperous and contented section of the community. So far from being a menace to or burden upon the Commonwealth they contribute in many ways to its welfare. Within the treaty limits the births during the year have exceeded the deaths by 262. In Ontario there was a gain of 115 births over deaths, in Quebec a gain of 117, in Nova Scotia 16, in New Brunswick 28, in Prince Edward Island 4, in Manitoba 42, in the Northwest Territories 49 and a loss of 100 as compared with births in British Columbia. This leaves a gain of 262, or a decrease of 6 compared with 1903.

ONE of the leading authorities on hockey in Canada, speaking on the degeneration of the game this winter, says in the course of an interview in Montreal recently:—"What I cannot understand though is why the players will use each other so much this winter. The leagues should take radical action with regard to the men who strike each other deliberately, and if example were made of the worst offenders the evil would be remedied. If such action as is recommended above were taken in this city on the next exhibition of brutality, such as shown last Friday night, the League would receive the thanks of lovers of clean and gentlemanly sport."

THE Maritime Merchant says:—Rather unsatisfactory reports are being received from Prince Edward Island; and while conditions there are not to be compared with those in St. Pierre, described elsewhere, they are far from good. We understand that an unusually large number of renewals of commercial paper have been reported since the first of the year. This has been, we presume, anticipated for some months by those who were following the trend of conditions there. The crops have been in some instances a complete failure and were all much below average. The hay crop was especially poor. They have been bringing in hay under the free freight scheme, but when that ceased at the end of the year the supply was still greatly inadequate, and a delegation has been sent to Ottawa to represent the state of affairs, and pray that the rebates be continued. At its present price, hay cannot be landed on the island under sixteen dollars a ton, and as cattle are said to be selling for less than that per head, the only alternatives presented, in the opinion of the delegation, are either freight-free hay or starved cattle. Very few Island cattle have been shipped to Halifax this year; and we understand that where the island usually has some half a million bushels for export annually, there is now little or none. Failures in P. E. I. last year numbered in the total liabilities of one hundred thousand dollars, and assets estimated at about thirty-seven thousand. The outlook for spring is that it will be a quiet one in a business way, but it must be borne in mind that the island is resourceful, that it has several strings to its bow, and need scarcely expect another such year as 1904 has proved to be.
