Dr. Pringle Must Pay
Sydney Separate School System Quite Legal

SYDNEY, N. S., March 7.—That the separate school system as existing in the city of Sydney is perfectly legal and in accord with the school laws of the province of Nova Scotia was the advice tendered to the City Council tonight by City Solicitor Finlay MacDonald K. C., who had been ordered to make a report on the subject following a strong protest from the Rev. John Pringle who recently notified the council that he would pay no further taxes.

OTTAWA, MARCH 5.—By a vote of 116 to 91 the want of confidence amendment of the Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, was rejected in the House of Commons a little before five o'clock this morning after an all night session.

By the same vote the motion to adopt the speech from the Throne was carried. The sub-amendment proposed by a Western member was not accorded a single vote in its support as both the mover and the seconder of the resolution were absent from the House when the vote was taken.

When the announced was made that Premier Meighen's Government had been sustained in its final division since he became premier there was a burst of terrific applause from his supporters and for several minutes the House celebrated the victory. Major Andrews, Centre Winnipeg and L. G. Gauthier, St. Hyacinthe, voted with the government. The address carried on the same division. Messrs. Bolvin, Molloy, Michael Clark, Maharg Reid (MacKenzie), Knox and Kennedy announced that they were paired and would have voted for the amendment.

Keen satisfaction is felt in government circles with the result of the division. At the opening of the session it was felt that the government might command a majority of between twenty-five and thirty. But illness and absence had called several government supporters—there was a difficulty over pairs—and it was thought that the government would be fortunate to secure even twenty. Some estimates placed the majority as low as from twelve to fifteen. A majority of twenty-five in a full dress debate, it is felt, is ample mandate so far as parliamentary followings is concerned, to the government to go ahead with its programme.

INCREASED POPULATION

WINNIPEG, MARCH 2.—The population of Greater Winnipeg is \$2,818, according to figures in the 1921 city directory issued today. This is the greatest gain recorded since 1914, and a jump of 10,869 over the 1920 figures.

TEN INJURED IN TORONTO

TORONTO, March 5.—A trailer on a street car ran off the track on the Gerrard street bridge here this evening and was sidwiped by another street car. No person was killed, but ten people were injured and removed to hospitals.

MONTREAL, March 5.—The Montreal cable under date of Dublin: "In the largest reprisal yet attempted in Ulster, Sinn Féin sympathizers today destroyed thirty-one houses in Rosslea in County Fermanagh.

"The destruction followed an attack on republican soldiers by Ulster Volunteers."

Ball Players Are Offered "Spring" Jobs

HALIFAX, Mar. 5.—Halifax amateur baseball players are much in demand in outside towns and yesterday three promising local boys were offered good jobs if they would change their address for the summer months. Two of these players receive offers from a western town, while the third is wanted in an eastern town. The local boys state they expect difficulty in playing ball this summer as the latest ruling of the M. P. B. A. A. U. of Canada, may interfere with their plans. They state they are not professionals and will have to work no matter what town they play for. Of course they will want to return to their native town and play football and hockey, but according to the amateur rule, they will not be able to do this. The ball players have been advised to investigate carefully before they make any move that would keep them out of other branches of sport in Halifax. The smaller Nova Scotia towns are more enthusiastic over sport than the larger places and are ready to go the limit to get a winning team.

Sugar Sale Control

HAVANA, March 7.—A presidential decree published here today places the shipment and sale of the remainder of the 1919-20 raw sugar crop under control of the Sugar Finance Commission, provided holders of 75 per cent of the crop signify within five days acceptance of such control.

This action was taken to avoid the market against the new, and in an endeavor to obtain the best price obtainable, having the old crop compete in price.
