THE FUR SEAL TREATY RATIFIED

WASHINGTON, July 25—The North Pacific fur seal treaty prohibiting Pelagic sealing and regulating the killing of seals on land was ratified by the Senate on Monday. The treaty does not take effect until accepted by all the signatory powers.

WESTERN COAL STRIKE MAY CUT OFF DUTIES

OTTAWA, July 25—In consequence of communications received from Alberta and Saskatchewan representing the probable grave effects upon the provinces of the shortage of coal should the dispute in the Western Mines be prolonged the Government is considering the advisability of rescinding the duties on all coal imported into the Western provinces pending the resumption of work in the mines.

GLASGOW, July 25—Plans for the steamer Aquitania, which the Cunard Co. is building have been modified to make the vessel the largest in the world. Her length will exceed 900 feet being ten feet greater than the 50,000 ton liner Imperator which the Hamburg American will put into service in 1912.

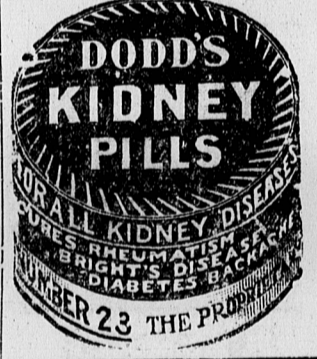
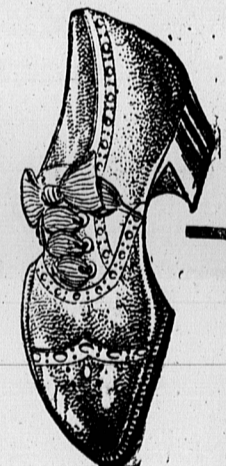
