We are too prone to look upon children's affair in the light of our own generation, not realizing that times have changed and a new day has brought in new ideas, new standards and new customs. Then, too, we forget what it feels like to be young—the sensitiveness, the urge for play, the craving for friendships and the desire to do and be as the others do and are and to have their approval.

READY-MADE
 We used to think that when we could slip into a ready-made dress, our troubles would be over—but we have learned better.

Observe how well the garment is made. Are the seams wide enough that they will not fray out? Are the stitches short enough to hold firmly? And how is the garment trimmed? It is the fault of cheap dress-makers to trim too elaborately. Trimming helps to cover defects. The really smart garment has beautiful lines but a chic absence of trim. If there is trimming, note how it is put on. Is it durable or perishable? Is it of the quality to add to the beauty of the dress or does it cheapen it? Avoid beads which come off easily and flimsy lace. Sometimes an ordinary dress can be made to look well by ripping off the cheap buttons or lace and

substituting better ones. Try the dress on as you stand in front of a full length mirror. Sit down in it and note how it looks and feels. It should not be tight enough to draw anywhere nor so large as to bag.

REDUCING DIET.
 Chocolate creams are probably the most weight-adding foods on the list. Milady who would be a perfect thirty-four, says, "No, thank you" when they are passed, and gives to her sister the box she receives as a gift. Gradually she acquires the "No, thank you" habit to other foods, including butter, pastries, potatoes, breads, mayonnaise, thick gravies, fried foods, sweet sauces, sugar combinations, macaroni, and fat meats.

SWEET BREATH
 In your contact with people, your breath becomes very noticeable to them, especially if it is bad. It is a pity to inflict this annoyance upon those whom you wish to please and it is an indication that something is wrong with you which you should correct and have better health afterward.

HOME-MADE ICE BOX
 To make your own ice-box, use an ordinary soap box, or fruit packing box. Set a covered pail in the middle of it, and bend a tin in a circle around the pail. Pack sawdust around the outside of the circular tin. Inside the pail, set your milk bottles and surround them with chunks of ice. Cover the pail and put newspapers over the top, and then shut down the wooden box cover. Such an ice-box will keep the baby's milk lovely and cold and costs only a few cents a day.

KEEP MOTHS OUT.
 Upholstered furniture is in danger of being invaded by moths unless we are very careful. The better grade of upholstery is so fine and tight that, if moths once get into it, it is almost impossible ever to be rid of them. To prevent this, see that the bottoms contain no rips or torn places. Spray upholstered furniture with a liquid made for this purpose. It may be purchased at the drug store and is odorless and will not spot the fabrics.

THE GUEST ROOM
 If you are one of those rare households which actually has a guest room today, and if you want it the acme of convenience, have as a part of its furnishings, one of those flat-topped benches, such as they have in hotels, upon which the guest may place his bag to unpack or pack it. Such luggage stands or stools are to be purchased in the folding variety, which may fold and place out of sight when not needed.

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FORK ROAST
 Something tart seems to be demanded with pork roast or with any fat meat, for that matter. Cranberry sauce, ketchup, mustard, horse-radish all have their place, but the next time you roast pork, bake a few apples with it. Place the apples in the pan beside the roast about a half hour before the roast is done. Let them bake tender and serve with the meat, putting them on the platter with it, as a garnish.

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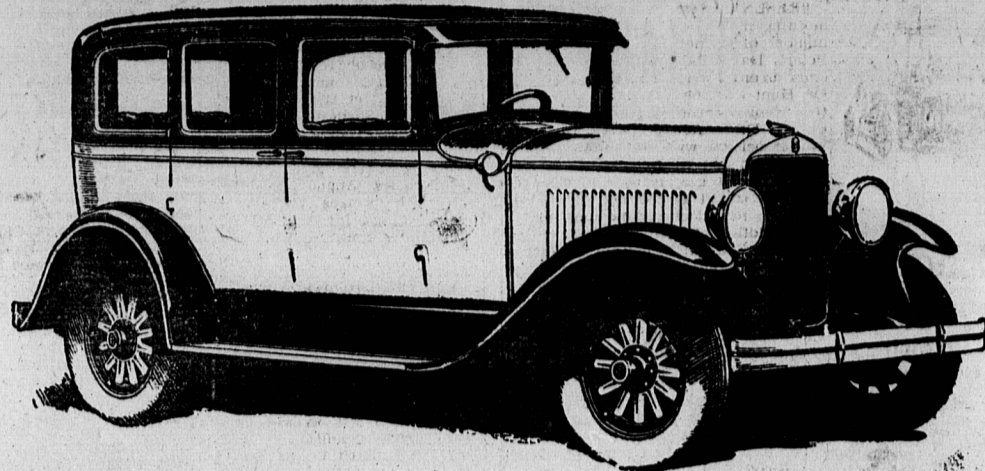
