SPECIAL NOTICE WHAT BORDEN GOVERNMENT IS DOING FOR AGRICULTURE

Strengthening the Foundation of the Country's Prosperity

When the Borden Government assumed office in 1911 they found the Department of Agriculture in a state of dry rot. The machinery was there, but there was no enthusiasm, no energy, initiative was discouraged and the department generally was making time. The main difficulty perhaps was that the department was starved for funds. No attempt was made to extend or develop the work. It could not be done without money.

Promise and Redemption.

Sir Robert Borden when in opposition realized the necessity of making the Department of Agriculture more useful to the farmers of Canada. As the basic industry of Canada agriculture he felt should be more liberally treated. He advocated closer co-operation between the provinces and the Dominion Government and declared that he would give prompt and effective aid to agriculture. One of the planks in his 1911 platform was: "The granting of liberal assistance to the provinces for the purpose of supplementing and extending the work of agricultural education and the improvement of agriculture."

The Liberals before 1911 had millions for the N. T. R., but little for the Agriculture Department. After the return of the Conservatives no time was lost in carrying into effect the policy laid down by Sir Robert Borden. The first step was the re-organization of the department. The present Hon. W. T. White and every other minister of the Cabinet adopted the attitude that the Department of Agriculture must have all money necessary for its development. With more general co-operation the department was re-organized, new branches were created and a forward policy along every line was vigorously inaugurated by the new Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Martin Burrell. As a result of the return of the three and a half years of Conservative government has been remarkable.

The last years of the Liberal regime the appropriations for the Agriculture Department was \$1,200,246.63. This was increased to \$2,700,400 in 1913 and to \$3,185,725 in 1914. For the year 1915 the appropriations were \$4,430,273. Nearly a million dollars more spent under the last year than the Liberal regime was voted for the work of the Agriculture Department this fiscal year.

The New Policy.

To carry out the plank in the Conservative platform providing for liberal assistance to the provinces for the work of agricultural development Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, introduced, the first session of 1914, a bill providing for a grant of half a million dollars divided on a population basis. Federal assistance of this kind was a new step in the history of the country and met with hearty approval from one end of the Dominion to the other.

This step, however, was only preliminary and during the year 1912, Dr. C. C. James, former Deputy Minister for Ontario and one of the best known agricultural experts in the country, was appointed to make a special survey of agricultural conditions and needs throughout the whole Dominion. Upon the report of Mr. James was based the Agricultural Instruction Act which was passed during the session of 1913. It provided for the setting aside of ten million dollars out of which the several provinces received annual grants practically proportionate to their population. The first year there was voted seven hundred thousand dollars. This was increased a million a year until 1917, from which year a million and one hundred thousand will be provided annually until 1923.

Wonderful Progress Results.

Money thus given to the provinces is expended under agreement between the Dominion Minister of Agriculture and the Provincial Governments. The result has been the bringing of fresh hope to the rural life of each province and an immense strengthening in the systems of agricultural education. Large sums have been spent in the erection of much needed buildings in the various agricultural colleges and the establishments of agricultural schools, such as those in New Brunswick and Alberta. It is estimated that nearly five thousand students of all ages are attending these agricultural schools and the short courses which have been instituted only by means of the Federal grant. Extensive demonstration and experimental work in dairying, horticulture, stock-raising and field husbandry have been provided for. It has further made possible strong assistance to the teaching of agriculture in the rural schools of the country, to which nearly one hundred thousand will be devoted this year. There has also been extensive aid to women's work in the direction of domestic science and women's institutes. Demonstration trains have also been paid for out of these Federal grants which carried practical teaching as to better methods to the farmers in the various provinces.

At the present time there are no less than 155 permanent positions filled by trained teachers in agriculture from directors of schools down to district representatives whose salaries are paid for out of the Dominion grants under the Agricultural Instruction Act. In many ways the whole spirit and purpose of the act have been achieved by enabling workers in agriculture all over the country to co-operate and to understand their joint problems more fully, and thus by

a common effort give an impetus to this important industry.

Experimental and Demonstration Work Enlarged.

To the Conservative party belongs the credit of having inaugurated the Experimental Farm System of Canada. The system was instituted under Sir John Carling in the Conservative Administration of Sir John A. Macdonald. Before 1896 it was greatly strengthened and expanded. Hon. Martin Burrell found the farms in a more or less rundown state. In many cases barns and equipment were at a low ebb and these institutions were not doing the work for which they were established—increase the productivity of the farms of Canada. Under the vigorous administration of a new lease of life has been established in various parts of Canada and the system of administration has been thoroughly reorganized in order to do the whole work of greater value to the farmers of Canada. In every branch of the work the present Minister has striven to secure the services of the best trained and most qualified men, and during the fiscal year as much money is being expended as in the experimental farm work as was spent by the Department of Agriculture for all purposes of the year before the Borden Government took office.

Mr. Burrell has had under consideration for some time a further extension of this work in order that the farmers of the country may more fully and directly derive benefits from the various investigations being carried on at the various farms. A comprehensive start has recently been announced in Southern Saskatchewan and Alberta which will be carried on into two branches last year. With a view to demonstrating the immense benefit that can be derived from proper methods the Minister has recently established all through these districts twenty to thirty illustration stations of easy access to the great majority of settlers.

Live Stock Industry Benefits.

When the present Government came into power the Veterinary Director General had charge not only of the health of animals, but also of general matters connected with the industry. The work was divided into two branches and under experts the work of the live stock branch has shown really astonishing development. While one hundred thousand dollars was devoted to the work the year before the Borden Government took office, this amount has been increased annually until in the present year \$550,000 is being devoted to this purpose.

A forward step was taken last year in the adoption of a policy by which pure bred sires were purchased by the department and handed over to the associations organized under regula-

Better Fruit, Purer Seed.

The importance of the fruit industry has been fully recognized by the present Government. Last year, in response to the request of fruit growers, a separate branch was established whose duties consist in investigating the general conditions of the industry and in assisting its development in every way. Important legislation was also passed amending the Fruit Marks Act so as to give more control of inspection of the fruit in the interests of both consumer and producer.

In various other ways departmental activities have been greatly increased. The Seed Branch has extended its general educational work in connection with matters affecting the purity and germinating qualities of seeds and also in the direction of financial assistance to provincial seed fairs and in encouraging the production of first-class seed generally.
