A SUGGESTION

Last year, according to the latest figures, our total gold output was in excess of \$43,000,000, and this, according to the best estimates, it will exceed \$50,000,000.

New Geological Map Of New Brunswick

The Geological Survey at Ottawa has recently published a map that it is hoped may lend an impetus to the search in New Brunswick and a section of Quebec for mineral deposits of economic importance. It is a map compiled by Dr. F. J. Alcock on a scale of eight miles to one inch, showing in colours the distribution of the various geological formations.

Eastern New Brunswick Geologists have shown, is underlain by the sedimentary formations of carboniferous age in which coal, gypsum, oil, gas, oil shale and salt occur. Sedimentary and volcanic rocks of greater age and of a greater degree of folding and alteration are found throughout the north-western half of New Brunswick, form a belt in the southern part of the province along the Bay of Fundy, and make up practically all of Gaspé in Quebec.

intruded by granitic rock which may be fairly continuous at great depth but which, as they are now exposed at the surface, form detached masses lying in two belts, one extending from the southwest corner of New Brunswick northeast to Bathurst, and the other running in a northeast direction, parallel to the Bay of Fundy.

Experience has shown that it is in the vicinity of igneous intrusives that metallic mineral deposits such as gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc and nickel are usually found. There is evidence that in the area covered by this map extensive mineralization has taken place as a result of igneous intrusion, and efforts should be made to discover deposits of mineable size and richness.

Most of the area is covered with a heavy overburden of drift and soil but outcrops occur along streams, in steep changes of slopes, in road cuttings, and along the coasts. Prospecting might be concentrated along stream courses and careful attention, the geological authorities say, should be given to the fragments of rock in the drift, as well as to the bedrock, and any mineralized fragments in the drift should be traced to their source in the bedrock.
