GENERAL HUGHES WILL TAKE STEPS TO PREVENT ALARMIST REPORTS.

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—General Sir Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, is in receipt of a cable from Major General Carson, denying the alarmist report cabled Saturday that two Western units, the Third Canadian Mounted Rifles, and the 31st Battalion, had suffered heavy losses in recent fighting. Canadian casualties on January 14 were four killed and thirteen wounded, and on January 13, totalled seven killed and fifteen wounded.

December losses among officers of the Canadian forces were correctly given as ten killed and twenty-nine wounded in a Canadian press despatch Saturday.

The probable reason for the error of the London correspondent is due to the fact that casualties among members of the Canadian forces are published simultaneously in London only once or twice a month, after being confirmed by the Ottawa casualty office and mailed to London, although publication in Canada of the latter takes place from day to day, as soon as relatives are notified.

Recently the same correspondent cabled a story that the First Battalion had been nearly wiped out, and as a result of the two reports causing such alarm and wide-spread inquiry, General Hughes is taking steps to see that there can be no recurrence of publication of stories of this nature unless they are borne out by the facts.

THE WAVE LENGTHS FOR WIRELESS STATIONS

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—An international schedule of wave lengths for wireless stations on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts will be the outcome of a conference of radio telegraph experts of the Canadian and United States governments held in New York G. Desbarats, deputy minister of the naval service, who with C. P. Ward, superintendent of Radio telegraphs, attended the conference on behalf of the Canadian government has returned to Ottawa. He stated today that the various problems of operation of powerful wireless stations without interference and with the other were considered by the conference. Solutions were found for some while, others are to be made the subjects of experiments to the stations affected.
