Origin of a Name.

One wonders, on reading in The Omaha Bee the following item, how the Kansan McKenzie came by the "Great Rebel's" name:—"One of the most intelligent men of the west is William Lyon McKenzie of Piper, Kan. The crop is pretty well distributed. Satisfactory reports are to be had from almost every section, and the dealers say that it now looks as if three times as many apples will be packed this year as were barreled last year. The price, however, is not so high, ranging from 50 cents to a dollar a barrel to the farmer, according to quality and kind. The dealers who bought by the orchard have no reason to complain, as the crop exceeds the early estimate. On the other hand, those who are buying by the barrel have no culls to handle and no risk to run from heavy winds.
