**SIR CHARLES DEPARTS.**

Sir Charles Tupper sailed from Montreal for England on Thursday morning last. At an interview with a Star reporter "he wore a light summer suit and white tie, and as he rested upon his cabin lounge he looked a man of fifty." Yet it is twenty eight years since the now veteran leader passed the half century milestone of 1 fe. Sir Charles in his vigorous old age is a credit to his country and a good advertisement for temperance as well.

Endowed with a naturally vigorous constitution, and living temperately he has been able to do a great deal of hard work without impairing his intellectual or physical powers. "His age is as a lusty winter, frosty but kindly," because "in his youth he never did apply hot and rebellious liquors to his blood."

Sir Charles was in a happy and jaunty mood, as he sailed. The long and exciting session that had fatigued and worn out many of the younger members and sent others to their long home had apparently left the veteran full of vigor and in the best of spirits. He had heard that Mr. Fielding, the Finance Minister might come over to run against him in Cape Breton at the next election. "I can assure you," said Sir Charles, "that I shall have very great pleasure in trotting over the course with the honorable gentleman." Just a trot over the course, mind you!

Just as, in reading the interview we begin to think of the Leader as a vigorous athlete, trotting over the political race-course, we are reminded that he is actually a father, and is arranging the affairs of one of his boys.

I may state to you that Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper will not again be a candidate in Pictou County. The Conservatives of that great constituency have refused to accept his resignation, but in my capacity as leader I shall prohibit my son from standing again for that constituency.

I should not allow this large constituency to be jeopardized by permitting a canvas to be made by the Liberals that the Conservative party had to send to British Columbia to get a man to represent them in Parliament. A convention has been called in that county when a successor to my son will be chosen.

This makes us remember that the boy is about 45 years of age, has been a Cabinet Minister and is a Knight of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George. But the boy may not have his own way, nor may the electors of Pictou make their own exclusive choice. The Leader and the Father of Sir Hibbert has something to say. "I shall prohibit my son from standing again for Pictou." And yet this does not strike us as arbitrary or dictatorial. Sir Charles dates back to the time when boys obeyed their parents implicitly, and has brought up his boys in that regard in the good old way.

Of course the veteran does not mince his words when speaking of the Laurier Government. He tells that they have more than once been placed "in a most humiliating position" during the session, and that "there seems to be a job in nearly everything the Government has anything to do with. It is a mass of incompetency leading to a carnival of corruption." We may make allowance here for the vigor and exuberance of language, for Sir Charles is yet so young, so imperious and so positive! Many of us ordinary mortals have been expecting that a federal election would come this year, because the unusual number of millions voted seem like a preparation for an appeal to the country. The election cannot be put off very long, and would the Govern-

ment venture to repeat next year the very large appropriation they have just now made? But Sir Charles does not anticipate an election this year, and he gives his reasons:

"The Government, in my opinion will not go to the country this year. They dare not do it in the present state of the public mind. The members of the cabinet have never been able to raise their heads since the Yukon exposures. They now rely solely upon vast expenditure of more."

"The Ontario Government and the Federal Government are going hand in hand. The Federal Government thinks of Hardy as its right hand, but this right hand will very soon be amputated. For the Ontario Government can never stand another election. Their doom is sealed."

These strong expressions of confidence that the Government is hastening to defeat may call up an incredulous smile on the faces of the Liberal leaders, and we need not accept them as necessarily prophetic. But the entire interview reveals the man—a natural leader of men, strong in himself, possessed of surprising mental and bodily vigor, and fully ready for the fray when the next campaign is announced.

The esteemed Examiner says THE GUARDIAN "seems to be sorry that it implied that the Provincial Opposition opposed the Hillsboro bridge and ought to be punished by the electors of Belfast." Now THE GUARDIAN is not at all sorry for anything that it expressed or implied in regard to this matter. We do not suppose that the Opposition were actually hostile to the bridge and railway. But they certainly made the mistake of placing themselves on record as opposed to the Provincial Government's plan of promoting the bridge. What would the present prospect for the construction of bridges and railway be worth if the Opposition had succeeded in defeating the government's plan?

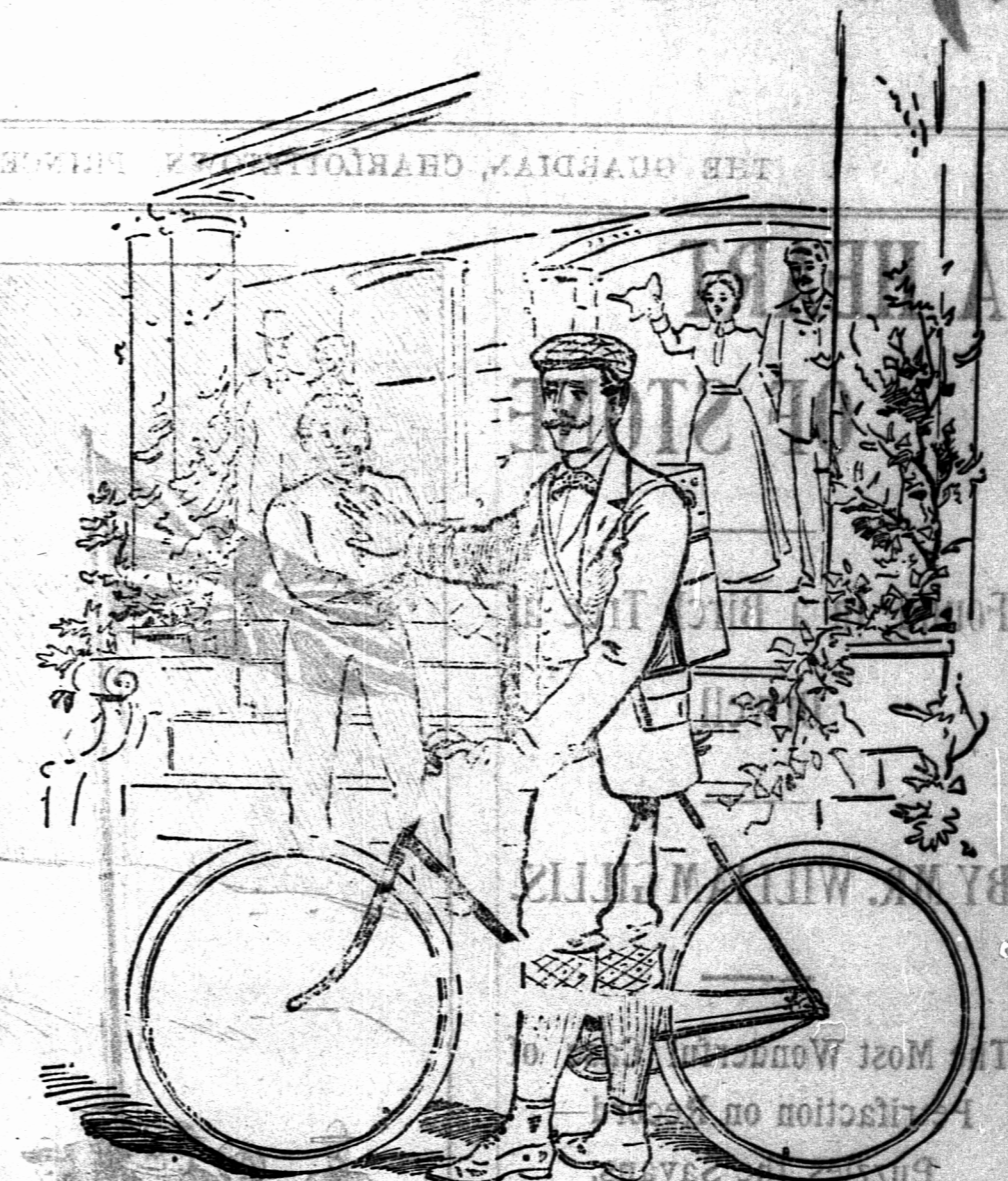
