

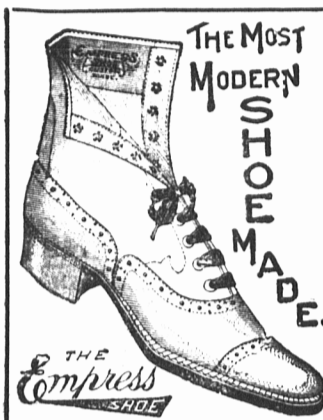

THE meetings in the Christian Church still continue. The interest is good. Rev. W. R. Motley is an eloquent, finished and interesting preacher of the gospel. One made confession Sunday morning. All are cordially invited to these meetings.

THE foreign mail which left Cape Tormentine yesterday about seven a. m. arrived at Summerside at 1.30 p. m. The train from the east which left Charlottetown at seven a. m. arrived at Summerside about 2.30 p. m., thus the mails from Tormentine brought to Cape Traverse by ice boats and thence to Summerside by train arrived here one hour ahead of the mail from Charlottetown by train, and yet there are complaints about the delays in the foreign mail traffic. The cause of the delay between here and Charlottetown was the snowed up condition of the railway track.

AN alarm was sounded at five o'clock yesterday evening for a fire in the dwelling occupied by Jesse Bernard at the north east end of the town. The fire started in some clothing etc., near a stove pipe in the second flat and was kept pretty well in check with buckets of water until the steamer Beaver threw her stream upon it and quenched it in about ten minutes. Considerable furniture, etc., was destroyed by fire, water and breakage and the building received slight but not serious damage. The house is a part of the old Green property and is owned by R. S. Brown. Mr. Bernard had no insurance on the furniture.

### FRENCH WRITER SETS OUT RUSSIA'S DARK DESIGN.

(Continued from page 1).

#### THE MORNING POST ON SITUATION.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—The Morning Post today devotes a long editorial article to an historical record of the rapid growth of American activity in Far Eastern affairs, comparing the present attitude of the United States with her passive interest in the Chino-Japanese war. The paper remarks on the notable pro-Japanese feeling in the United States, after such a long traditional friendship with Russia and contends that American friendship for the empire was always artificial. Admiral Dewey's guns, the paper continues, literally shattered the superstition that Russia was the appointed friend and Great Britain the appointed enemy of the United States.

"We believe," the Morning Post concludes, "that the appearance of America as a working element in international affairs and her unmistakable hostility to Russia, is destined to become epoch marking in its epoch making."

#### FAISLITY OF RUSSIAN YARN CONFIRMED.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—The British foreign office has received an official despatch saying that not one of the Japanese torpedo boats was injured in the attack on Port Arthur on Wednesday, Feb. 24.

#### JAPS GOT RUSSIANS PANIC STRICKEN.

YIN KOW, Feb. 25.—Native reports that the Japanese have landed at Posslet Bay and subsequently undertook operations against Hunchun and towards Kirin, have received qualified confirmation from English missionary refugees who have arrived at Newchwang.

These people say the Russo-Chinese bank has removed from Kirin to Kwang Cheng Si, where commercial interests are seeking safety and defense.

This reported advance has produced consternation among the European civilians residing in the line of march.

It is reported also the Russian government bureau at Vladivostok has withdrawn to Kharavivsk.

#### RIG RUSSIAN FORCE FOR KOREA.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 25.—According to information received by well informed military men, the Russian army which is intended to operate in Korea will consist of an advance vanguard of two regiments of Siberian sharpshooters, a vanguard of sixteen regiments of infantry, with ninety-six quick firing guns, three batteries of mountain guns and a corresponding force of cavalry. The main body will consist of forty regiments, including Cossack cavalry, with 300 guns. It is added that no important military operations will be possible before the melting of the ice and that the present operations will be confined to necessary preparations.

#### DENIES STORY FAVORING JAPAN.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Replying to Earl Spencer, the leader of the Liberal party in the house of lords, this afternoon, the first lord of the admiralty, Lord Selborne, categorically denied the numerous stories recently printed of British partiality to Japan as against Russia.

#### TOKIO SATISFIED WITH GERMAN ATTITUDE.

TOKIO, Feb. 25.—The views expressed by Emperor William of Germany before and after the beginning of the war which are characterized here as broad and disinterested, have created a favorable impression and are tending to remove the prejudice which at one time existed against him.

#### RUSSIANS MURDER JAPANESE REFUGEES.

PEKIN, Feb. 25.—Private advices received here from Newchwang confirm the reports of the ill-treatment of Japanese refugees at the hands of the Russians while they were journeying through Manchuria, and declare, moreover, that some of the refugees were without doubt cruelly murdered. The Russian soldiery at Newchwang is so undisciplined that the place is unfit for European women.

#### SACRED IMAGE TO SCARE THE JAPS.

MOSCOW, Feb. 25.—The most sacred image in Russia has been sent to St. Petersburg and it will be taken later to the Far East with the army. This image is a representation of the Virgin appearing to St. Sergius and is always kept at the Trilozko monastery. It is about one foot square and is covered with precious

#### JAPS REFUND \$115,000 TO AMERICAN CONCERN.

TOKIO, Feb. 25.—The Japanese government today passed the famous white whiskey claim by handing United States Minister Grison the draft for \$155,000 in favor of the American Trading Company. The claim arose from a custom house decision rendered in 1900, holding an importation of 8,000 barrels of whiskey to be alcohol and increasing the duty from 40 to 250 per cent.
