### POWER IN FRANCE FOR MARRIED WOMEN

LONDON, June 30.—A Paris correspondent of The "News" writes: If you ask a typical Paris girl for her view on marriage she will probably laugh at first and shrug her shoulders with that so-called Parisian air of indifference which is simply a

gesture of dissimulation and no more Parisian than the habit of cigarette smoking. Then she will tell you that in fact she is looking for a suitable husband, but finds that the men she meets are fitted with difficulty in her scheme of things. They are 'difficulties' in short. If you call again six months later

you will find her as often as not busily making herself a tresseau and sending invitations to her relatives and friends. French girls marry young because, although many careers are now open to them, it is still the most usual and obvious thing to do. Marriages are still "arranged" by well-meaning parents or guardians, but even when they are not arranged they take place at an earlier age than in Great Britain. Power is what a woman in France seeks and finds in marriage. "Madame" as a title carries with it not merely dignity and status, but a claim for attention and respect not always vouchsafed to "Mademoiselle." Frenchwomen have no political influence at all, and they, social and moral sway begins on their wedding day.

There is more clamor for comradeship and economic independence between husbands and wives among the men in France than among the women. Married couples divide their activities into watertight compartments and then proceed to tear down the barriers in favor of a single, uncomfortably damp, muddle. Monsieur works and earns while Madame deals with the home - - - or at least she spends part of her time doing that. The remainder she likes to spend in basking in the adoration of her husband and the admiration of her friends and his. And the less work in the home she has to do the more basking she has time for and the more attention she receives.
