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P.W.C. - S.D.U. Rugby Game Ends In Deadlock Despite Overtime Play

After fighting tooth and nail for ten minutes of overtime play, a scoreless tie yesterday in the fourth game of the P. E. I. Inter-dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College left the teams deadlocked, with a win, a loss and two ties games each. The game was played on the S.D.U. gridiron and was finally called because of darkness. A fifth game is planned in the series which started out to be a best of three affair.

The two teams, so evenly matched in fighting spirit and ability that it becomes almost unbelievable, battled it out every inch of the way, with both having their chance of scoring only to be thrown back by the team on the defensive. At other times the game was deadlocked at centre field with neither team able to make a substantial gain.

The P.W.C. Welshmen had the slight edge during the first half and kept the play pretty well centred in S.D.U. territory. Despite some nice backfield running attacks by the Welshmen, led by the three-quarter line they were being smothered right and left by the heavy tackling of Saints forwards, and it was they would couldn't crash through the sturdy Saints' defensive. However, the play was not by any means all in the S.D.U. zone, with the red and white boys making repeated attacks deep into their opponents' territory. On one occasion they went over the line on a knock-on play only to have the play called back by referee Jim McCallum for an infraction of the rules. The Saints also pulled some nice ball-carrying attacks with Murphy, O'Connor and Cash making running gains. The Saints were holding the play on the Welshmen's 25-yard line when the half ended.

Second Half
 In the second half the play was around centre field for the first ten minutes, with the Saints making short sorties into P.W.C. territory only to be forced back to centre field on each occasion, without either team making very substantial gains. Nevertheless, the game featured some nice football, with both teams doing some very effective tackling and line plunging for short gains. It was near this point that O'Brien, sturdy Saints forward, had to leave the game due to a leg injury with McCarville coming in to replace him.

The Saints forced the play a little stronger for the next five minutes or so and hammered away in an effort to go over for a score from their opponents' fifteen yard line, but the Welshmen's line held firm and inch by inch they forced Saints back out of easy scoring range. The Saints had a beautiful opportunity to open the scoring about this time when they received a penalty kick on the Welshmen's 20-yard line just off to one side, and on the attempt his kick went wide of the uprights. The P.W.C. boys then took to the offensive, and steadily forcing the Saints' back soon took the play down to their 25-yard line but after making a few futile attempts to gain extra yardage, were forced back to centre field in play which featured a couple of nice running attacks by the Saints. The play was when reversed again, however, when Brown, speedy Welshman three-quarter man cut loose with a nice piece of broken field running to take them back into Saints' territory.

The Saints weren't long in moving the play out of their own territory, and were again holding the ball in P.W.C.'s zone when the whistle went to end the half.

No indication has been given of the salary being paid the skater, but an M.C.A. spokesman earlier indicated that the figure was "unprecedented." It has been rumored that \$10,000 a week is being paid to her.

Navy Defeats Saints 8-3 To Take Lead In City Hockey League

In a wide open game at the Forum last night the Navy squad trounced the Saint Dunstan's University team by a score of 8-3 to take the lead in the City Hockey League.

First Period

The Navy then started to take the attack and forcing the goal of the game, scored the scoring at the seven minute mark when MacGregor soloed in from just outside the blue-line to rifle one past goalie Crete. The play then settled down and was wide open with both teams again having some close ones. It was not until past the 15-minute mark that the Navy really opened up their scoring spree, with Higley denting the twines on a nice passing play with Perry and Strain inside their opponents' blue-line, and MacGregor soloing in again less than two minutes later to secure his second goal of the game.
