THE VICTORIA A MATEUR HOCKEY ASSOCIATION FORMED

At a Very Largely Attended Meeting Last Night in the Board of Trade Rooms the One-Time Famous Victoria Hockey Club Comes Once Again to Life.

Over one hundred were in attendance last night in the Board of Trade rooms for the purpose of reorganizing the one-time Victoria Hockey Club which went out of existence some years ago.

The large attendance augurs well for the success of the new organization and the interest and enthusiasm shown at last night's meeting speaks well for its future permanence.

As a result of the ballot, Lt. Col. J. S. Jenkins, M.D., D.S.O., was elected President; Dr. J. B. Reid, Vice-President; T. B. Rogers, Secretary; Dr. J. E. Blanchard, Treasurer. The executive comprise the following:—Dr. A. B. Reid, Percy Rodd, Chester Campbell, Arthur Campbell, and Harry Morgan.

By a unanimous vote of the meeting Mr. E. E. Parkman was nominated and elected as Honorary President, and seconded that the name of the club would be the Victoria Amateur Hockey Association.

MEETING HELD MONDAY NIGHT AT WE BSTERS CORNER

Concerning the Advisability of Connecting the Georgetown Railway Line With the Murray Harbor Line

A well attended and representative meeting of the residents of Port Augustus, Johnston's River, Auburn, Dromore, Glenfman and other places south of the Hillsboro, was held Monday night at Webster's Corner Hall, when a very interesting discussion took place on the advisability of extending the Georgetown railway line from Mount Stewart on the south side of the East River and connecting it with the Murray Harbour line.

Mr. Peter Cumiskey was appointed chairman; and Mr. Reuben MacDonald of the Patriot, appointed secretary.

The chairman set forth the object of the meeting, referring to the handicaps which the people have to contend with in regard to transportation, and stressing especially the need of better facilities for marketing the potato crop.

He was followed by Mr. David McDonald who submitted copies of a petition which were ready to be circulated. He read the reasons as set forth in the petition why railway facilities should be provided.

He spoke of the growing potato business, and the difficulty in getting potatoes shipped from that district. "The wharves are no benefit to us," said Mr. MacDonald, "if we don't get a railway it will be a serious matter for us. Although we have one of the most fertile parts of this province, we have too many vacant farms.

The next speaker Rev. Father Croken said that coming as a stranger to Fort Augustus he realized the transportation handicaps under which the people were labouring. The railway was not of much use to them. The granting of the facilities asked for was important to the whole of the Parliament Canada needs a greater production in order that the individual burden of taxation may be lightened by being distributed over more shoulders. We want to hold on to our own people. He had nothing to say against immigrants but more that can be brought in are equal to our own people. Though the government may bring in many immigrants, the newcomers, in course of time, many wander as your own young people do, unless they can make a livelihood. Father Croken then spoke of the great fertility of the island and its agriculture potentialities. What are needed are better facilities for shipping our

on the excellent way in which they had prepared the memorial. He expressed his pleasure at being present at the meeting. He had tried to get in touch with Mr. Sinclair on the telephone, and tell him about the meeting, but the line was out of commission owing to the alet storm.

"I know the people of this district as well as any man," said Mr. Jenkins, "know what trouble they have had due to lack of transportation. This is an important problem for all parts of Canada. From all over the West there are demands on the government for more branch lines. When the Railway Commission turned down requests, the people in certain sections became very sore and said there was a deep dyed plot so that the C. P. R. would slip in and occupy the territory. Mr. Jenkins spoke of other sections of the Island such as Canoe Cove, New London, French River, etc. that have been looking for branch lines. These sections will certainly sympathize with the people of Fort Augustus. "I would love to tell you that the railway would start tomorrow," said Mr. Jenkins, "but I will make no rash promises. As your representative I will be pleased to have your petitions presented to the proper authorities, and no doubt I can be of assistance to you. Mr. Jenkins expressed his delight at the able manner in which the speakers had presented their case. Father Croken had touched the right chord. We need to keep our people at home. Measures should be put into effect to that end. There should be provision made by the government for loaning money to young men to establish farms of their own.

Mr. Jenkins spoke of the lack of Canada. His room mate in the House of Commons, Mr. Bowman, formerly Minister of Mines in the Drury Government, came from Manitoulin Island, which had a population of 10,000 and no railway.

In conclusion Mr. Jenkins referred to the splendid property in the Fort Augustus district for potato growing, and to the paramount importance of adequate transportation facilities.

The following were appointed to circulate petitions in their various localities: John McGuirk, Edmund Curley, Peter Holland, John J. MacCarthy, Damien Lafferty, Fred Cumiskey, Peter Trainor, Peter Cumiskey, Alfred Mitchell and Albert Robertson.

The petitions read as follows:—
To His Excellency the Governor General of Canada in Council,
Your Excellency and Gentlemen:
This memorial from the residents of the south side of the Hillsboro River, in Queen's County, the Province of Prince Edward Island, and of the adjoining parts of the western section of King's County, humbly sheweth:

(1) That the section of this Province in which your memorialists reside is one of the most fertile sections of a province noted for its agricultural productiveness and for the excellence of its crop and of its live stock outputs.

(2) That the main line of the Prince Edward Island Railway is on the north side of the Hillsboro, a wide river varying in width from over a mile down to a quarter of a mile or thereabout. The Murray Harbour Branch runs along the southwest side of this Island where it is of no benefit to us. To the north the Georgetown Branch runs from Mt. Stewart to Georgetown and Montague and is also of no benefit to us who are situated between these two lines.

(3) That the distance between these two branches is about 15 miles through a fairly level country, thickly settled and possessing a very fertile soil none of which derives any advantages from such branches.

(4) There is no adequate water service on the river.

(5) Owing to the want of railway and water transportation your memorialists are put to great inconvenience in shipping their live stock and other produce and that they frequently sustain heavy loss in the more perishable of their farm products, such as potatoes, which form a large and most important part of the products of our farms.

(6) That the trains from Georgetown on the Georgetown branch now arrives at Mount Stewart in the early part of the forenoon and remains there until late in the afternoon. A link line from Mount Stewart to the Murray Harbour Branch at a distance of about three miles from the Hillsboro

Bridge would furnish the so greatly needed facilities for the whole of this section of the province, and which section would also provide a large increase in traffic for the Georgetown Branch, which would run right through to Charlottetown without the necessity of transferring passengers and freight at Mt. Stewart as at present.

Your memorialists therefore, most respectfully request that Your Excellency in Council may be pleased to take such measures as may be necessary for building the said link line and to recommend the same to the favorable consideration of the Parliament of Canada.

A vote of thanks was tendered Messrs. Jenkins and MacDonnald for attending the meeting, and the chairman for the capable way in which he presided.
