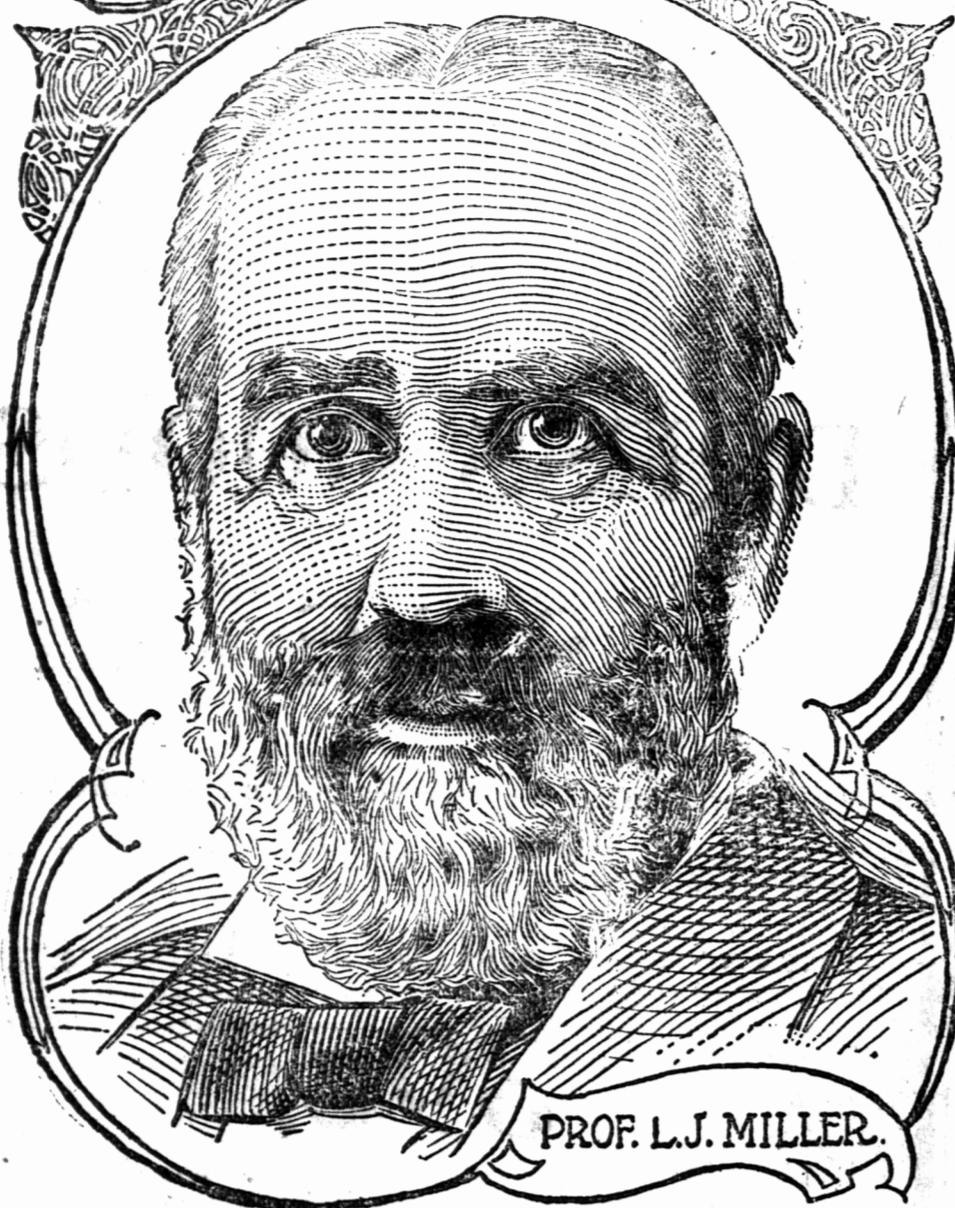

YESTERDAY Laurena Welch, a young girl of Tignish who was arrested on a conviction of selling liquor and whose imprisonment in Summerside jail has been the subject of much comment during the past few weeks, left on return home having been released through the efforts of Neil McQuarrie, K. C. From the facts of the case it appears that a man called at the home of the girl's mother and asked for a flask of whiskey. The mother was sick in bed and the girl told her what was wanted. The mother requested her to give him the whiskey, which she did. For this she was summoned to court, before Stipendiary Tweedy and, not appearing was convicted and on Feb. 19 was committed to jail. Certain parties interested applied to Mr. McQuarrie to take steps to have her discharged. Mr. McQuarrie finding that she was under 14 and that no evidence had been adduced as to her capacity to understand whether or not she had done wrong, applied to a Judge of the Supreme Court for a writ of Habeas Corpus for her discharge, on the ground that under the law the girl was, prima facie, doli incapax, that is, incapable to do mischief. The Attorney General on being made acquainted with the facts did all he could to expedite the bringing to hearing of the case with the result that a hearing was given Thursday and an order made for her immediate discharge. The order was presented to Jailor Gough yesterday morning and the girl went home.

A joint meeting of the Summerside Town Council, Board of School Trustees and the Council of Board of Trade was held Thursday night to consider the advisability and means of continuing the Manual Training in our public schools. Mayor McNeill presided.

Prof. Anderson, Charlottetown, was present and addressed the meeting. He spoke in the highest terms of the results of the work and referred to the system as not retarding the progress of pupils in other studies, but rather acting as a stimulant. He showed how at a moderate cost the work could be continued, and gave his hearers much information regarding the practicability of the system and its many advantages.

Richard Hunt after speaking strongly in favor of further adopting the system, moved a resolution that in view of the valuable results arising therefrom that the School Board and Town Council be respectfully requested to gratefully accept the said offer (of Sir Wm. McDonald) and make such arrangements in conjunction with the Local Government as may be required for efficiently carrying on the work of said school.

Mr. McQuarrie seconded the resolution and referred in favorable terms to the benefits to be derived from continuing the system.

Capt. Jos. Read in supporting the resolution also used convincing arguments as to the advantages gained by such a system.

Principal Campbell expressed himself strongly in favor of continuing the work. He thought it almost impossible to over-estimate the educational advantages gained by Manual Training. He had personal knowledge of boys who had been brightened up by this work who under any other course of training would not have made any advance. He referred to the great amount of knowledge gained by the boys in the school. He believed the system would eventually become necessary. Girls as well as boys derive much benefit from such a course. In the matter of cost there would necessarily be some expense at the beginning, but in a short time one of the regular teachers could do the work.

Ronald Campbell, J. F. Blagden, William Stewart, D. K. Currie, W. D. McIntyre and E. H. Wright, each also gave expression of their hearty approval of taking the step proposed.

The resolution was passed unanimously, after which a vote of thanks was tendered Prof. Anderson for his valuable assistance, and the meeting closed.
