A number of the men are also being given a harness course being held in the garage several nights a week.

NURSES' ALUMNAE DANCE.—Several hundred people attended the annual dance of the Nurses' Alumnae of the Charlottetown Hospital held last night in the Holy Name Hall. A very enjoyable evening's entertainment was presented which featured the music of the orchestra. Popular music was played by Ding Connelly's Orchestra. The hall was fittingly decorated for the occasion and a sprinkling of "The Merry Widow" and other services added color to the event.

ANNUAL BALL.—The Sporting Club annual masquerade ball held last night was a decided success. Several hundred dancers were present and spent an enjoyable evening at their favorite pastime. The entertainment commenced at nine o'clock and lasted until two this morning. Many attractive costumes were worn by those taking part. Music was supplied by Don Messer and the Islanders.

Y'S MEN'S CLUB.—The monthly business meeting of the Charlottetown Y's Men's Club was held last night with Mr. James Haslam in the chair. The business reports were one referring to the recently organized Junior Hi-Y Grad Club. Eleven members belong to this club at present and it is open boys between the ages of 15 and 18. Mr. E. Clawson was appointed to represent the Y's Men's at tonight's War Loan meeting in City Hall. Guests at last night's meeting included: Mr. Lt. Rev. A. C. French, Chaplain of the R. A. F.; Cpl. Thomas Cogle, R.A.F.; and Mr. Maxwell Corkum.

IS GUEST SPEAKER.—Guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Kinsmen Club at the Charlottetown last evening was Dr. P. A. Creelman, who gave a most interesting and instructive illustrated address on "Fighting Tuberculosis." Dr. Creelman most ably discussed the causes, prevention and cure of the disease and supplied considerable information regarding tuberculosis among the members of the armed forces. The progress made on Prince Edward Island in fighting the disease was also mentioned and it was pointed out that although last year the death rate for this disease was 59.1 per hundred thousand the average over the last ten years was approximately 30 per hundred thousand and as compared to approximately 50 per hundred thousand for all Canada. Treasurer Chas. York presented his report covering this year to date and stated that approximately \$270.00 had been raised for service work. Kinsmen Taylor, chairman of the Milk for Britain campaign then gave further encouraging news reporting that last week's collections totalled \$30.21. It was also claimed that the meanest man in the world hadn't died yet as it was necessary to report that another milk bottle was stolen which was known to have been half-full of donations for Milk for Britain. Considerable discussion was carried on regarding extension of the campaign throughout the province. The matter was left for further investigation by the Ways and Means Committee. Further plans were discussed regarding the Kinsmen Anniversary dance to be held February 26th to further aid the Club's service work.

Disapprove of Premier Hepburn

OTTAWA, Feb. 5 (CP)—A number of Liberal members representing Ontario constituencies in the House of Commons in caucus tonight passed a resolution of disapproval of Premier Hepburn of Ontario and recording their loyalty and confidence in Prime Minister Mackenzie King.

It was not disclosed how many members attended the caucus. The resolution expressed the belief of the caucus that Mr. Hepburn no longer represents Liberalism in the Province of Ontario.

It stated that Mr. Hepburn for some years had "directed his effort toward embarrassing and insulting" the Prime Minister and was "presently seeking to defeat a minister of the Crown who would be helpful to the government and to the Canadian people at this critical time."

The resolution was made public by W. H. Golding, chairman of the Ontario Liberal caucus. Asked if it was unanimously adopted, Mr. Golding said there was nothing to be added to the bare text of the resolution.

Hepburn Comment

TORONTO, Feb. 5 (CP)—Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario commenting tonight on the action of Ontario Liberal members of the House of Commons in Ottawa who passed a resolution that he "no longer represents Liberalism" in Ontario, said it was "an absolutely stupid move."

"It would be just as stupid for the Ontario Liberal members to meet in caucus and read Prime Minister Mackenzie King out of the party," he said. "The Ontario Liberal party has maintained no affiliation with the Dominion body for several years."

His first comment, when the resolution was read to him, was: "What, again?"

Named Director

TORONTO, Feb. 4 (CP)—George Williams of Queensville, Ont., today was named Director of the Canadian Swine Breeders' Association at the annual meeting.

Other officers elected included: Alex Hamilton, new Perth, P. E. I., Director for the Maritimes. Mr. Hamilton held the same position last year.

evening and continued today from sunset to sunset. The sixth day of the shelling found the besiegers trying to shell the besieged out of north shore positions facing Johore Bahru. But the British gunners gave as good as they got.

Besides the shelling, the Japanese defenders also smashed at enemy observation posts and transport facilities carrying Japanese troops into position for the expected water-borne assault on this island stronghold.

The daily communique said that the results of the Japanese shelling were "negligible."

The British batteries were hammering transports in the Johore Bahru area. R. A. F. planes on reconnaissance reported "much enemy movement southward in Johore."

Mr. Fraser, the first speaker of the day in the debate, claimed the Committee for Total War gathered its followers together by subterfuge, leading them to believe they were being summoned to Toronto to plan for the victory loan.

Mr. Fraser said there could be no "equality of sacrifice" and asked M. J. Goldwell, acting C.C.F. house leader, if he thought union men would leave production lines to work on farms. The answer would be "no," he declared. He said it was his opinion better results could be obtained without conscription.

Mr. Lockhart read an editorial from the Buffalo (N.Y.) Courier-Express in which "French Canada" was named as the barrier standing in the way of immediate action by the Canadian government for unlimited compulsory service.

Mr. MacInnis commented upon the appointment of Hon. Humphrey Mitchell as minister of labor, succeeding the present secretary of state, Hon. Norman McLeary.

"For lack of understanding of working-class needs and for the most colossal ineptitude in dealing with labor problems, I thought that the former minister of labor was in a class by himself," Mr. MacInnis said.

"But without being yet long enough in office to be elected to Parliament I believe the new minister has already shattered the record of the secretary of state for doing the wrong thing at the wrong time."

He referred to the Kirkland Lake situation where gold miners were striking for union recognition—a dispute which he said never should have gone to a conciliation board.

Mr. MacInnis charged that the new minister had "double-crossed labor" and while the government was on record as favoring collective bargaining, it had virtually abolished collective bargaining.

Other survivors were 16 United States defense workers who were on route to the southern base.

The other Canadians, all crew members, were: John Simpson, Montreal; Charles Bolivar, Upper Lachave; N. S. Edmund Kelly, Kentville, N. S.; Ralph Corwin, Halifax, N.S.; Robert Clayton, Hantsport, N.S.; William B. Ton, Hamilton, Ont.; Leo Thompson, Halifax, N.S.; and Murray McNeill, Halifax. All left for Montreal tonight.

The "Capital" Keel is called by fellow-survivors, has been sailing 19 of his 38 years and this time he had a premonition that something was about to happen.

"My wife and I each had this feeling about two or three weeks before I left," he said.

The first torpedo put the wireless and lights out of commission. The second one smashed the mast of the lifeboats. Three lifeboats were lowered, including one with Capt. Hundley O. Giffin of Goldboro, N.S. aboard.

"I know definitely the other boats weren't shelled," Kelly said. "I saw Captain Giffin's boat get away from the Lady Hawkins but after that . . ."

They picked up survivors as we pulled away from the boat and heard cries from others struggling in the waters but were unable to save them.

A heavy rain and wind storm blew up the first night "and the boat was tossed around like a cork" but after that the survivors were favored with "exceptionally good weather."

"Our baby (2 1/2-year-old Jeanette Johnson) was the best-behaved of the bunch," Kelly said. "One day she looked a little feverish and I gave her some brandy. That fixed her."

"We sailed about 120 miles before we were picked up at about 10 p.m. on Friday the 23rd. Five of those in the boat, including one woman, died of exposure. We saw smoke smudges on the horizon several times during those five days but no ship."

Kelly, born in England, said he worked on the possibility of at least two weeks in the lifeboat and gave out rations on that basis. The daily food consisted of one biscuit, one-half in the morning, a tin of condensed milk, one spoonful of water and one spoonful of condensed milk.

Tax Collections For January

OTTAWA, Feb. 5 (CP)—Revenue Minister Gibson announced today January income tax collections totalled \$49,304,119 compared with \$29,057,595 for January 1941.

Total income tax-revenue for the 10-month period from April 1, 1941, to Jan. 31, were \$494,440,563 compared with \$202,605,598 in the corresponding period of the previous fiscal year.

Only one of 19 income tax districts—Charlottetown—reported a decline for the 10-month period.

Collections in remaining districts with the increase over the corresponding period of 1940-41 in brackets included: Halifax \$11,080,273 (\$7,525,152); Quebec \$7,588,756 (\$4,919,340); Saint John (N. B.) \$9,793,839 (\$4,595,987).

Charlottetown at \$656,149 was down \$28,482 compared with the previous 10-month period.

Urges All Legion Members To Give Affirmative Answer

MONTREAL, Feb. 5 (CP)—Lt.-Col. W. C. Nicholson, Dominion vice-president of the Canadian Legion, said tonight that all members of the Canadian Legion and citizens in general should give an affirmative answer in the forthcoming Federal government plebiscite on conscription for overseas service and then "put pressure on the government to wage a total war."

Lt.-Col. Nicholson addressed members of the Canadian railway veterans branch of the Canadian Legion.

Rain pamphlets Over France

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 (AP)—In the most extensive pamphlet bombing of the war much of occupied France has been showered with American pamphlets that the Nazis eventually will be thrown out of France and tattered into defeat.

A total of about 3,000,000 leaflets, Presidential Secretary Stephen Early said today, have been dropped by Royal Air Force fliers in two extensive sweeps over occupied France. He called it the "biggest pamphlet bombing job ever done."

Early did not say when the second bombing took place, but disclosed that on this expedition 37,500 copies of American pamphlet No. 2 were dropped in addition to thousands of copies of pamphlet No. 1 which previously had been made public.

No. 2 included excerpts from President Roosevelt's annual message to Congress telling of this country's plans to produce 18,000,000 tons of merchant ships this year and next.

It also included Mr. Roosevelt's promise that the United States will "put the weapons of war at the proper time into the hands of those men in the conquered nations who stand ready to seize the first opportunity to revolt."

Bombing expedition No. 2 was carried chiefly on the Brittany peninsula—a maritime section which might be the invasion point for any united nations expeditionary force to the European continent.
