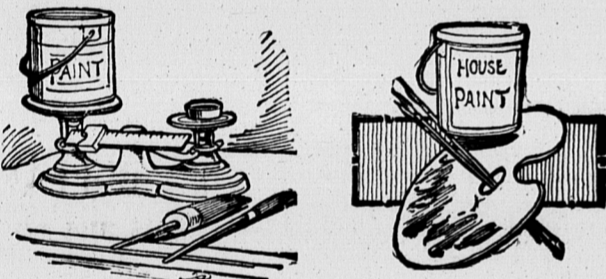
BRIDE WENT TO THE STATES; HUSBAND HAD TO REMAIN HERE.

SWISS FORM A SNAIL TRUST.

GENEVA, May 1.—A snail trust has been formed in the canton of Soleure, and if the negotiations succeed the trust will cover the three principal snail raising cantons of Soleure, Vaud and Neuchatel.

The French prefer Swiss snails to home grown ones. The wholesale price for snails in this country is six pence (about twelve cents) a dozen, and the trust wishes to raise the price and the quality next winter season, as well as to extend the "farms."

AMERICANS FACE NEWS PRINT FAMINE.

NEW YORK, May 1.—After John Norris, chairman of the committee on paper, had announced at the meeting of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association yesterday that the Government reports from paper mills showing stock on hand April 1, indicated that there was less than a six-day supply of paper for the newspapers, the association instructed its president to send the following statement to congress:

"As a result of a strike in the mills of the International Paper Company the price of news print paper for transient needs has advanced approximately \$9 per ton within the last five weeks. A condition approaching a paper famine is imminent.

"The commissioner of corporations reports that the stock on hand at paper mills on March 31, 1910, was 19,907 tons, which is less than a six day supply for the newspapers. Within three years the newspapers have encountered three such panics in paper supply.

"Aggravating the situation is the official announcement that pulp wood cut from crown lands after May 1, 1910, cannot be exported. The American supply of pulp wood is almost exhausted.

"Many of the American mills are dependent upon Canada for their supply of raw material, so that the action of the Provincial authorities brings to the print paper industry of the United States a menace which the special committee of the house of representatives, after a ten months' investigation of the subject, attempted to avert by its unanimous recommendation for legislation.

"If final action in adjusting this paper matter with Canada is deferred for ratification and approval by congress until next winter, it is probable that the newspaper's loss due to this delay, will reach millions of dollars.

"We ask that you promptly act upon the bill proposed by the chairman of that committee, James R. Mann (H. R. bill 12,314) entitled 'A bill to encourage and promote commerce between the United States and the Dominion of Canada,' and authorizing the free entry of wood pulp and printing paper in Canada, provided all restrictions on the exportation of pulp wood and wood pulp are removed. The good faith of congress was pledged to adopt the recommendations of that special committee."

HOME RULE FOR SCOTLAND NOW.

EDINBURGH, May 1.—At the sitting of the convention of Scottish Burghs, in Edinburgh, a few days ago Lord Provost Macnab of Perth, presiding, a resolution in favor of home rule for Scotland was carried. The subject was introduced in this wise: Ex-Provost Anderson, Stornoway, moved: "That in the opinion of the convention it is desirable that the Imperial Parliament should devolve on the people of Scotland the control and management of their local affairs by a Legislature and an executive in Scotland subordinate to the Imperial Parliament."

The point was at once raised whether this was not a political question, but the mover declared he approached the matter from the social point of view. If they had self-government many of the questions now troubling them would be solved.

A member, raising a point of order, said this was a political question, and to discuss it they were simply making themselves ridiculous. The chairman held that the motion was in order.

Ex-Provost Anderson—Why are you afraid to discuss this question? I do not want to dissolve the union. He proceeded to refer to the circumstances of the union, when it was remarked by Provost Muir of Annan: "We did not come here as a convention to listen to a historical lecture."

Provost Jamieson, Linlithgow, seconded the motion. Ex-Bailie Anderson, Glasgow, said that representatives of Gowan, Clydebank, Pollockshaws and other communities in the west were at present in London wasting public money in trying to explain to English barristers and an English committee matters that should have been settled in Edinburgh. No business man would ever think of seeking advice upon affairs from those who know nothing about them.

The motion was adopted.

STOVES FIGHT JACK FROST

WOOSTER, Ohio, May 1.—The State experiment station introduced something entirely new in Ohio fruit culture when it placed 100 stoves in the peach orchard on the station farm to protect the tender buds from the frost predicted. Several hundred more stoves will be placed in the orchard to protect cherry trees and also other fruit trees.

The use of stoves in orchards has been done in the West, but has never been tried in Ohio, where this year two weeks of warm March weather caused fruit trees to bud.
