## MONDAY

**COUPPING, PULPIT**—Rev. C. St. Jean, who is occupying the pulpit of Zion and St. James Churches during the absence of Rev. R. M. Macdonald on vacation preached at both services for those churches yesterday. This morning the service was held at St. James and in the evening at Zion.

**WILL ATTEND CONVENTION**—Commissioner of Provincial Police, J. J. Trainor leaves this morning for Quebec City where he will attend the convention of chief constables of Canada to be held on June 10, 11. The commissioner expects to be absent about a week.

**FUNERAL AT GANGES, SALT SPRING ISLAND, MAY 8**—The funeral of the late Lydia Drake, wife of Arthur W. Drake, who passed away at her home in Ganges under tragic circumstances on Tuesday, May 5th, took place on Wednesday at 3 p. m. The late Mrs. Drake was a native of that island and was thirty eight years of age. She leaves to mourn her loss, her husband and four young children, her mother and three brothers and two sisters. Mr. Arthur W. Drake is a son of the late Mr. Samuel and Ella Drake, West River, P. E. Island.

Citizens heard with regret of the death of Mr. Ernest E. Parkman which took place at his home at 3 West Street Saturday afternoon, after a brief illness. Mr. Parkman who was a well known contractor was 52 years of age. He was born in Charlottetown where he lived all his life. Although in failing health for some time, Mr. Parkman was taken seriously ill about three weeks ago, and gradually growing weaker passed away.

He is survived by his wife, and by his daughter Mrs. Eva Fisher, Halifax.

Citizens of Bequete were shocked to hear of the accidental death last night of Mr. George Wright, a prominent citizen and owner of a sawmill in that district.

Mr. Wright, who owns one of the best saw mills in this part of the Province, had returned to the mill after supper as was often his custom. His son, Lewis, went down to the mill after he had done up the chores about 7.30, and found his father lying across a log with a very serious lacerated wound of the chest, apparently dead. He immediately called Dr. Sharp who pronounced life extinct and gave his opinion that the wound was sufficient to cause instant death.

It is thought that a log had stopped the mill and he had evidently attempted to jam the circular saw with a board, when he must have tripped on a log and got caught in the saw. Dr. Tanton was notified and considered an inquest unnecessary. The accident was considered purely accidental.

Mr. Wright was an elderly man of 65 years of age and somewhat crippled. He had lived for a number of years in Bequete, but formerly belonged to Cape Traverse. He was highly respected by all classes of citizens and much sympathy is felt for the bereaved.
