THE GOVERNORSHIP.

Near the close of the session at Ottawa Senator Ferguson drew the attention of the Government to the expiration of Governor McIntyre's term and inquired concerning a new appointment. Hon. R. W. Scott replied in substance that the matter, not being urgent, had not then been formally considered by the Government, but would receive attention at once when the session closed. But the close of the session has not brought the appointment.

In the days of Conservative rule the Liberal Opposition were wont to object to any Governor holding office beyond the date of his five years term. The objection was based on a principle which appears

to be sound, and ran in this form:—"During the term of five years from the date of appointment a provincial Governor is in an entirely independent position. He cannot be removed from office except for cause, which cause must be submitted to Parliament and be of a character to satisfy Parliament of its sufficiency."

"But the moment the five years term has expired these conditions are changed. The Governor then holds office from day to day. Should he displease the Government his successor may at any time be named. Should he prove in all things subservient to the wishes of the Ottawa authorities they may continue him in power indefinitely. These are not wholesome, or pleasant, or dignified conditions. They are conditions of inferior and compromising to the Governor; they place the relations between the appointing power and the Governor on a false basis and tend to make the highest office in the Province a position of dependence and subserviency."

So ran the old time Liberal objection to a Governor holding office after the expiry of his regular term. Whatever force there was in this objection ten or twenty years ago exists with equal strength today. It is quite as important that the independence and dignity of the gubernatorial office should be preserved now as it was then. But our Liberal Government has shown a marvellous proclivity for doing the very things against which they most strenuously objected when the Conservatives were in power.

Complaints received The Guardian that the working trains near the city are insufficiently lighted in the night time. An engine with about twenty flat cars goes and comes at frequent intervals, the engine running backward at the head of the train going out, while the inward trip is made with the engine pushing the train before it. Thus in neither case is the engine headlight visible to persons crossing the track. Under such conditions there is great danger at the level crossings. If accidents are to be prevented there should be a strong light, like a locomotive headlight kept constantly exposed on the forward end of the train. Level crossings are always a source of danger, and this danger is increased tenfold when working trains are running all night without sufficient lights. Lives are in peril every night from this cause, and the most careful precautions should be taken by those in charge of the trains.
