The Sheriff's return of Councilors elected at the recent election was read by the Clerk after which Councilor Pope on behalf of the Old Council extended a cordial welcome to the new members of the Board. Mayor Campbell replied. The minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Several bills were presented and the sum of \$1474.45 read and ordered to be paid. Councilor Pope reported for the Finance Committee and moved and seconded by Councilor Strong that the Town Council negotiate with the Bank of Nova Scotia for a loan of \$90,000 less. Councilor Strong introduced the following motion which was carried unanimously—Resolved that the Town of Summerside record its sense of the great loss sustained in the sudden demise of the late Senator Patrick C. Murphy, not only to the Town of Summerside and the County of Prince but to the whole province. It was further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the widow and family of the deceased with the sincere sympathy of the Mayor, Councilors and citizens to them in their bereavement. It was moved and carried that the building on the south end of the Town wharf be sold at auction on March 14. As there was not a full Board present the Council adjourned to meet next Monday, March 16.

—See Three Ways To Ensure Peace

LONDON, March 10.—That the British cabinet's concern for the views of the dominions of the impracticability and unsoundness of almost the whole Geneva protocol draft is indicated by the unofficial statement that the imperial committee of defense finds that articles numbered 14 to 17 require drastic amendment before they are acceptable to Britain and the empire. It is felt that the whole protocol treatment is such as to make these vital matters compulsory. Arbitration, league intervention, legislative and executive determination of aggressor states putting into operation of sanctions, either without any decision by the league council or by majority vote must be radically amended and some of them wholly deleted. The British cabinet's statement is a point where they will have to consider theories of three schools of thought:

—Balfour in Third Group

—First, those demanding a direct pact with France and Belgium.

—Second, the policy of isolation without European entanglements.

—Third, those favoring a mutual pact between Britain, France, Belgium, Italy and Germany.

—The cabinet is credited with belonging to the first group, though this is possibly due to his inheritance of Ramsay MacDonald's promise to Heriot.

—The second school holds few of the big leaders.

—The third school includes the majority of ministers, claiming Lord Balfour as the leading spirit.

—Now, though the dominions might incline toward the isolationist policy were it feasible, the situation is so changed by military, naval and aerial inventions, the developments of the great war, that Britain is unable to adopt the isolationist policy, no matter how much she might desire to, and is bound in self-preservation to regard the continental side of the channel at least as the only safe ground for her safety against aggressors.

—Suez Vital Point

—Moreover, Britain is vitally interested in the safety of the Suez route which, in turn, is bound up with the European situation.

—Chamberlain is, therefore, forced to make a choice between the first and third schools of thought or find a yet undiscovered formula of security.

—A factor favoring the third school is the bringing of Germany into concert with the western European powers. This would detach her from a possible combination with Russia and thereby from entering a counter-alliance with Asiatic powers, which might in future become a menace to nations with Pacific ocean ports, including
