SOME LOCAL NEEDS.

In the hurly burly of civic and federal elections it will not do to lose sight of the important matters affecting the City and port with which the federal authorities have to do, such as the location of the new railway station and the extension of the rails along the harbor front. To those improvements not only is The Guardian committed, but our Board of Trade and City Council, two bodies especially entitled to speak for the entire community, have pronounced in their favor in the most unmistakable manner. Those bodies are on record by resolutions adopted with great unanimity and communicated to the Government at Ottawa.

We briefly recite the attitude of these various representative bodies and men and of our citizens generally, (more fully set out in these columns at the time) in order to remind all concerned how fully and entirely the community is committed to these important improvements. Some money for the station has been already voted at Ottawa, and during the recent visits of Hon. Messrs. Prefontaine and Fielding the matter of the George Street site and the extension of the rails was strongly urged upon their attention. Since then matters have rested. Apparently nothing has been done and there is nothing doing. Obviously the matter cannot be permitted to remain in this condition much longer. The time for final decision and definite action is upon us.

It becomes of vital moment to know whether the will of the community is to be carried out. An election is pending and a session of Parliament is very near at hand. Our new member of Parliament to be elected on the 16th of February, will be a most important and powerful factor in determining that question. The Government will naturally look to him for the last word in this matter before proceeding to definite action. It therefore becomes of urgent interest to learn from

the two candidates in the field what attitude they take in regard to this most important matter. It ought to be made known, either from the public platform or through the press. Should the latter course be chosen, it is needless to say our columns are open to either or both the candidates to declare themselves.

Is the Government in defiance of the expressed will of the people to choose an eastern site instead of a central one for the station and to build a railway wharf, costing possibly \$100,000 or more, and which will pay no taxes, and refuse railway communication with existing city and private wharves, thus destroying the value of the properties and largely diminishing the city's revenue? We cannot believe it. But we want assurance made sure upon this point. Charlottetown with half the population of the riding of West Queens within its limits, has surely a right to be heard in a matter so vitally affecting her interests. Besides it can easily be shown that every farmer who ships his produce to or through this port by rail, or who has occasion to visit the centres of business in this city, has a direct interest in the improvements asked for. This is a matter of far more importance to the people of Charlottetown than is involved in the difference between the two continental railway schemes. It comes straight home to us, and it cannot be side-tracked or evaded.
