

BOTTLE DRIFTED ACROSS THE ATLANTIC.

NEW YORK, January 16—The adventures of a whiskey bottle, which drifted with the ocean currents, all the way across the Atlantic, are told in a letter received from England by J. C. Lavin, a New York engineering expert. Mr. Lavin threw the bottle over the rail of a house boat on the Long Island coast, in August 1909. He left a card with his name and address inside, and has just received a response from Merionethshire, Wales, saying that the bottle was picked up there on December 20. It took the bottle nearly two years and four months to cross the ocean. When picked up the odor of whiskey was still strong according to the Welshman who found it.
