### GAME AT FORUM ON TUESDAY

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 13—New York Rangers left for home tonight to open their National Hockey League games on Madison Square Garden ice with Murray Murdoch's iron-man record threatened.

The durable forward, who has not missed a game for nine full years, was hurt in last night's game here against Montreal Canadiens, it was learned today.

Murdoch was crushed into the boards by Art Lesieur, Canadian defenceman, and the lateral nerves of his chest were injured. He had cold compresses and hot applications on his chest through the night, alternately.

Before leaving Manager Lester Patrick said he would dress Murdoch and put him in for a few minutes at least to keep his record intact.

Grey-haired Lester filled in at defence himself today during a practice, as the team is short handed on rearguard duty with Earl Seibert still a holdout, and Harold Starr injured. Starr skated lightly but took no part in scrimmages. Patrick said, however, he had no intention of getting into a real game.

President Frank Calder left for New York to attend the opening game there tomorrow when Rangers meet Toronto Maple Leafs.

Chicago travels to Detroit for a battle with Red Wings in the only other game scheduled.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 13—William Gill, who was known in the Maritimes as "Big Bad Bill" when he played defence with the Canadian amateur Moncton Hawks, has been suspended from the Montreal Amateur Hockey League, President Frank Calder, revealed today.

Gill, who signed his first professional contract with Toronto Maple Leafs, refused to report to St. Louis in the American Association as ordered.

"He either will play where he is told," said Calder, "or he won't play at all. The decision rests with him."

## Bantamweight Title Bout On Friday Night

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 13—Two small packages of fistic dynamite will be thrown into the Madison Square Garden ring Friday night and the resultant detonation is expected by many to blow Lou Salica off the bantamweight throne.

Sixto Escobar, little Puerto Rican gamecock, never has been convinced that Salica really earned the decision he was awarded when they clashed early last September in a bout for New York recognition as titleholder.

He came down from his mountain training camp today to reiterate his oft-stated opinion: "I'll win 'way off this time. Knockout, sure." Ringing confidence also came from the other quarters as Salica and his handlers returned to New York. The titleholder's manager, Hymie Caplin, said the little Italian from Brooklyn had not experienced any trouble making weight this time and that he was stronger than ever.

The bout is scheduled for 15 rounds.

The wrestler's bride said the secrecy was to avoid the presence of a curious crowd at the wedding.

## Canadian Golfer And Partner Win Tourney

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PINEHURST, N. C., Nov. 13—Gene Kunes, the Canadian open golf champion, and Dick Metz of Chicago staged a rousing finish today to land the \$400 first money in the mid-south professional best-ball tournament with a score of 137 for 36 holes.

Needing a birdie and a par on the last two holes to beat out Tommy Armour and Bobby Cruikshank who were already in with 138, the Kunes-Metz combination came through with a stout-hearted exhibition.

Kunes laid his tee shot on the short 17th within 10 feet of the cup and trickled in the downhill putt for a duck. His partner came through in the pinch at the 18th. Metz' second was in a trap to the right of the green. The Chicagoan blasted out, however, to within eight feet of the hole and stabbed down the put for the par four that meant first money.

Kunes and Metz shot a 69 and a 68 while Armour and Cruikshank had a pair of 69's.

## Pick Cochrane Or Hoppe To Win Title

CHICAGO, Nov. 13—Walter Cochrane, of San Francisco, holder of the 182 balk line title, and Willie Hoppe, of New York, 181 title holder, loomed today as possible winners of the world's three cushion billiard championship.

Cochrane has won four straight victories and goes into action again tonight against Augie Kleckhefer, of Chicago, a former champion.

Hoppe, who jumped into undisputed possession of second place by defeating Otto Reisel of Philadelphia, remains idle. Hoppe has won four of his five starts. He had all he could do to turn back the stubborn defence of Otto Reisel, of Philadelphia, last night, 50 to 38 in 53 minutes.

The veteran Tiff Denton, of Kansas City, noted squirrel snapper of the Ozarks, and Kinney Matsuyama, of Tokyo, Japan, scored upsets yesterday that knocked the champions back on their haunches.

Denton beat Johnny Layton, of Sedalia, Mo., present titleholder, 50 to 38, while Matsuyama bowled over Kleckhefer, 50 to 33 in 39 innings. It was the second straight defeat for both Layton and Kleckhefer.

## Death Claims F. J. Navin Owner Of Detroit Tigers

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DETROIT, Nov. 13—Frank J. Navin died of a heart attack today, five weeks after his Detroit Tigers gratified the long-deferred ambition of his life by winning the world baseball championship.

He fell unconscious, from his favorite riding horse at the Detroit Riding and Hunt Club, and died without recovering consciousness. Coroner Albert Hughes said death was caused by stoppage of the heart by a blood clot in an artery.

Close associates said the 64 year old silent man of baseball, a power in the game for nearly three decades, had paid, almost literally, with his life for the one world championship his baseball team won.

Five years ago, these friends disclosed today, his physician told him he must sell his baseball club and shun all excitement if he wished to prolong his life. Repression of his emotions, his outstanding characteristic, had taken its toll in stomach and heart disorders.

Not only did Navin refuse to heed that advice, but he set out more resolutely than ever to build a baseball team than would be the peer of any other in the colorful history of the game.

His fortune was depleted by the depression, but he borrowed \$100,000 and bought Mickey Cochrane as manager, in the greatest gamble of his career. That was at the close of the 1933 season. One month and six days ago, the inspired Tigers dethroned Chicago Cubs in the deciding game of the World Series.

Navin, discarding his "poker" face for once, capered like the school boy that his closest friends knew him to be at least.

Today, Mr. and Mrs. Navin, both enthusiastic horseback riders, were out from the Hunt Club. Navin, wearing his favorite Irish jumper, "Masquerade," along the wooded trail, Mrs. Navin lost sight of her husband. Then she saw his riderless horse cantering toward the stables. She galloped back to the club and gave the alarm.

Roy Thorne, stables superintendent, found Navin, lying beside the bridle path.

Taken to the nearest hospital, he was pronounced dead after 25 minutes of attempted resuscitation.

News of his death brought a flood of telegrams from members of the baseball fraternity. Judge K. M. Landis, Commissioner of baseball, declared "there is real mourning today through the membership" of organized baseball. Judge Landis said he and Will Harridge, president of the American League, would attend the funeral.

For many years, Navin had been vice president of the American League. He served temporarily as president following the retirement of M. C. Byron Bancroft Johnson and was a power in all League councils.

Navin, a lawyer by training, acquired an interest in the Detroit Tigers in 1902 and from that time on, devoted to baseball the acumen that would have taken him far in any profession.
