To Sail Again Among Islands On Inland Sea

(By The Canadian Press) MIDLAND, Ont., Oct. 5.—Launches 50 years ago at Kingston as the sidewheel steamboat Maude, for Lake Ontario service; entirely rebuilt some years later and rechristened the steamship America, then in 1920 brought to Midland and re-named for Georgian Bay routes, the motorship Midland City which plied up on a reef a few weeks ago, will be running as good as ever when the season opens next year, her owners declare.

As steamboat, steamship and motorship the Midland City has had an interesting career in great lakes navigation.

On Aug. 26 last on account of unusually low water the motorship struck a jagged ledge of rock four miles off this port while returning from a Sunday afternoon excursion with 150 passengers aboard.

Despite the rocks towed in 25 feet from the vessel, the propeller, the bottom and a damaged propeller, the vessel was able to limp across the two miles of intervening water to beach at Midland Point, under the command of Capt. Ed. Mackie.

There with all passengers safely removed, the motorship was hoisted on a barge, while her crew took a melancholy tilt sky-wards, till her fore-foot was seven feet from the water.

There the Midland City lay for ten days while divers went down to plug the hole and build a cofferdam of planking and canvas round the submerged stern. Then marine pumps were put in place, and a tug nosed alongside to supply the steam power. For fifteen hours the pumps worked steadily. The motorship was towed into 25 feet of water, while her propeller, the bottom and a damaged propeller, the vessel was able to limp across the two miles of intervening water to beach at Midland Point, under the command of Capt. Ed. Mackie.
