## LIQUOR MEN ARE LEAVING HULL

Ottawa Citizens Laying in Stores for the Dr. Reason.

(Special to the Guardian)

OTTAWA, March 28.—The exodus of liquor men from Hull has commenced. It was learned this morning that large consignments of liquor were shipped from Hull to Thurso since Saturday. There will be the only "wet" place in the Hull district after May 1, when local option goes into effect in Hull.

The liquor men have had to add to their delivery facilities. In one instance six wagons are employed to bring over to Ottawa the orders of local restaurants. Citizens in all walks of life have purchased liquor by the case and the packages are sent by the express. The liquor men state that the shipments in many cases are ordered by the purchasers for "medicinal purposes."

## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District where he wishes to make his claim. He must be a Canadian citizen, or a person who has been naturalized in Canada, and must be of legal age and sound mind. ## NOTICE To Farmers and Dealers

GENTLEMEN: Owing to the increasing tendency lately to place hogs on the market before properly finished, we wish to notify all concerned that we must positively refuse to handle any such hogs that do not come up to the regular grade required for packing which must not be less than 110 lbs. An occasional small hog down to 100 lbs., if plump and well fattened, may be taken at a reduction of two cents (2c) per lb. from price of standard weight, but any lighter than that cannot be received at any price. It would really be in the farmers' own interest to feel those small hogs until properly finished. It is generally agreed that it is in the last few weeks of feeding that the greatest profit is to be secured. Consequently, if in either of these small hogs before properly finished, the farmer is not only injuring the industry which we are endeavoring to develop here, but also depriving himself of the profit so nearly within his reach, and which is fairly due him.

By playing on the market the quality of pork demanded by the trade, the farmer will be cooperating to maintain the reputation for QUALITY which we are proud to say, D. and F. products now enjoy, and at the same time will secure for himself a return more in keeping with that to which he is entitled.

The immediate future of the pork industry here depends largely on the farmer who deals with the present situation. The present high cost of feed can only be a temporary condition. Better even to carry unfinished hogs over until feed from next fall's crop is ready—and the present outlook gives every encouragement to do so—rather than kill off small, immature and only partly finished hogs at present and dispose of them at a loss. A loss it must surely mean for all concerned, as they yield no profit to the producer, while to the packer they are worse than useless, as it would only injure our reputation to place on the market the inferior quality of meats derived from them. For these reasons we must insist on all hogs being properly finished; otherwise dealers will refuse to receive them.

On March 9th, 1918, death visited the home of Mr. Peter MacDonald, Craignud, and took away the beloved wife and mother, who although an invalid for almost five years will be sadly missed. The deceased was a lady of strong character and a devout Christian and had many friends whose sympathy goes out to the bereaved family in their loss.

To live for evermore.

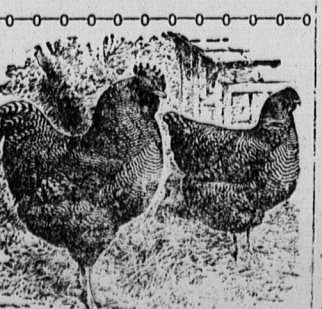

## JOHNSTON'S RIVER EGG CIRCLE

The annual meeting of the Johnston's River Egg Circle, was held in the Johnston's River school on Friday evening, March 22nd, the President, Mr. Wm. McDonald, in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. The Secretary, Mr. Chas. Walker, then read the financial report of the Circle, after which the manager, Mr. J. T. Beagen, read his report, which showed not only the average circle price, but also the average store price from May 28th till Oct. 31st, and gave figures to show that after all expenses, such as commission and grading, the circle was still in advance of the stores. He also showed the quantity of No. 2 eggs sent by each member, and the loss sustained by same, which was very small compared with the number of eggs shipped. There were 21 meetings of the circle for months the circle sent 6187.7 doz. and received \$2039.35, and an additional sum of \$226.31 in cash and capital certificates. A total of \$2265.66, or an average of 36.73 cts. per dozen. The report being read the chairman then complimented the manager upon the very efficient manner in which he managed the affairs of the circle for the past three years, and hoped he would continue to act as such.

The meeting then proceeded with the election of officers, and the following directors were appointed: Percy Mutch, Edwin Brazil, Martin Kingham, Wm. McDonald, Wm. McEachern, Wm. Currie and P. R. Trainor. Wm. Kerr, Maritime Poultry Representative, then addressed the meeting during which many questions were asked by Mr. Patrick O'Halloran, Mr. Joseph Power and others, which greatly contributed to the success of the meeting, and as Mr. Kerr clearly explained everything, information was thus gained by many who had hitherto not fully understood the by-laws of the Association.

Mr. Geo. Lightizer, manager of the Candling Station, was then called and spoke briefly on the work of the Candling Station, and complimented the members on the quality of their eggs. He also spoke on the potato question. The business of the meeting being over, the following program was rendered, after which hot coffee and luncheon were served by the ladies of the circle:

Beagen (conductor); step dance, Mr. Martin Power; quartette, Misses Margaret and Florrie Walker, Erma and Blanche Power; recitation, J. T. Beagen; violin selection, Miss Blanche Power; quartette, Mrs. J. T. Beagen, Evelyn Beagen, Percy Mutch and J. T. Beagen.

Lunch being over, Mr. J. T. Beagen moved that a vote of thanks be tendered Messrs. Kerr and Lightizer for their attendance at the meeting and for the courteous manner in which they received and answered all questions. It was seconded by Mr. Percy Mutch, and supported by Mr. Joseph Power, both of whom spoke of the pleasure they had in attending the meeting and in the information acquired.

Mr. Lightizer fittingly replied, also Mr. Kerr, who said it afforded him great pleasure to be present, and although only a small circle, it was the best meeting he ever attended. He was delighted with the program and

complimented Misses Power and Walker on their violin selection. The step dancing, too, was much appreciated, and as was also Mr. J. T. Beagen's song and recitation, in which the circle was suitably boosted. Mr. Lightizer then tendered a vote of thanks to the ladies for their hospitality and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.
