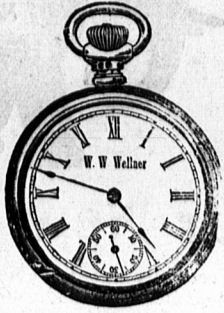

R. in his jurisdiction. Passenger traffic, Mr. Perry says has been good and is still keeping up remarkably well.—Moncton Times.

In its description of the board of trade and commercial travelers' room in the Halifax exhibition, the Halifax Recorder refers in glowing terms to Alfred Ellis, of that city, who has been one of the traveling staff of Henderson & Potts, the paint manufacturers of Halifax, for many years. It says: The room is in charge of Alfred Ellis, of Henderson & Potts, who has kindly consented to give his time thereto during the exhibition. His presence is worth much to the success of such a place, as he is not only the best known traveler on the road, but his genial manner is such as to make everybody feel pleased that they have visited the room and conversed with him. Mr. Ellis has "covered" the maritime provinces probably longer than any commercial man now on the road. And few there are indeed who do not know the genial "Alf" Ellis.

Word has just been received of the appointment of Prof. John Brittain, late of the University of New Brunswick, and who will speak at the P. E. I. Teachers Convention here today and tomorrow, to a chair in the new college which Sir William McDonald is erecting near Montreal. Prof. Brittain is to have charge of the nature study branch, which will be one of the foremost positions in that institution, and will have attached to it a remunerative salary. This appointment will take effect a year from this fall, when it is expected the new building will be completed. Mr. Brittain is a native of King's county, N. B., and for several years during his early life taught in the public schools of that county. Three years ago Prof. Brittain resigned his position at the Normal School, having received an appointment from Sir William McDonald as instructor in elementary science and school gardening in a number of Carleton county schools, with headquarters in Woodstock. Last winter he was appointed to the University of New Brunswick, where he assisted Prof. Jack as instructor in elementary science. In the spring he resumed his work in the Carleton county schools. Prof. Brittain goes back to the University of New Brunswick again this fall, where he will remain through the winter, and in the spring will again assume charge of the school gardening of the rural schools until time to take up his work in the new college.

DIOBY COURIER: At the recent session of the Baptist convention of the Maritime Provinces, held in Charlottetown, P. E. I., a resolution was passed to the effect that an official should be appointed who should act as corresponding secretary and superintendent of Home Missions, and financial secretary for denominational funds, his field of operation being the provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island; the nomination was to be made by the finance committee of the convention and a committee of the Home Mission Board. This joint committee met at Bridgetown, on the 11th inst., and unanimously nominated Rev. I. W. Porter, of the Bear River Baptist Church. The Home Mission Board met in Yarmouth on the 14th inst., and confirmed this nomination. On Sunday, 17th, Mr. Porter resigned the pastorate of this church in order to accept the position, his resignation to take effect Oct. 5th. Mr. Porter has been in Bear River five and a half years. Two years ago he received a call to North Sydney at a considerably increased salary; but declined it in accord with the unanimous vote of the church here. His services have been frequently sought by other churches, and on the day of his appointment he received notice of a call to another of the strong churches in the province. Mr. Porter will take up his residence in Wolfville.

HARRY HILLMAN, Jr., running in the colors of the New York A. C., made a new world's record in a 300 yard race Saturday at New York, the time being 34.5 seconds. This is exactly two seconds better than the previous time made by A. C. Kraenzlein, formerly of the University of Pennsylvania, who did the distance over the two hurdles in 36.5 seconds at Chicago on May 12, 1897. The contest took place at the games of the New York A. C. John G. Flanagan, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, champion hammer thrower of the world, threw the sixteen pound missile 172 feet 1 1/2 inches which is 9 1/2 inches short of his own world's record figures.

AMONG the acrobatic features of the Charlottetown exhibition vaudeville which will be seen at the York Theatre Friday evening and Saturday afternoon of next week only will be the celebrated Brothers Lanelle, the champion aerial gymnasts of America, who will give sensational and thrilling performances on the revolving ladder. As a finale to this act, the ladder on which they have been performing suddenly separates and the audience breathlessly watches for a calamity that will result in one or more serious accidents, but it is soon noticed that the athletes are left wildly whirling in mid air on a single bar. This is one of the most sought after acts in vaudeville and is presented by the management with much confidence.—St. John Times.

**THE EXHIBITION FORMALLY OPENED**

By His Honor the Lieutenant Governor Yesterday Afternoon—Speeches by Prominent Men.

The formal opening of the Provincial Exhibition took place at 2.30 yesterday afternoon. After the National Anthem had been played by Worth's Band Hon. F. L. Haszard K. C. in introducing the Lieutenant Governor who was to formally open the Exhibition intimated that next year the probability was that a much larger exhibition than ever before would be held here. Next year the Dominion Exhibition would be at Halifax and it was hoped that a much larger ground would bring here much of the live stock from the upper Provinces.

His Honor the Lieut. Governor in formally declaring the exhibition open referred to the entries being larger than ever before, notwithstanding that many of our Island people, regretfully, are going west. Still the best were still at home and we can herewith see what they can do.

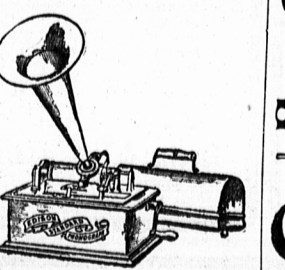
He congratulated the directors on their good management and complimented the exhibitors upon the trouble they had taken in getting their goods here. All we want is good weather and it is hoped that a great many more than ever before will be seen, principally owing to the opening of the Murray Harbor Railway. Exhibitions are beneficial in enabling our people to see where they are at. They can look around and compare with their neighbors. He advocated our people going into mixed farming. Thus a partial failure in the crops does not leave the people altogether in ruin. He urged co-operation among the farmers citing Denmark as an example of the good of progressive dairying. The education given by the different lecturers has been very beneficial and is doing much to the good of the Island. He spoke strongly in favor of the continuity of exhibitions in this province.

Premier Peters expressed his pleasure at being present to see the exhibition again opened this year. He regarded exhibitions as a sort of experimental farm which teaches each farmer from his neighbor to do better. He was pleased to hear from President Haszard the hope that next year the exhibition would be conducted on a much larger scale than ever before. Notwithstanding that it was an off year in fruit he was glad to hear from competent judges that the fruit exhibit was quite superior to that of Nova Scotia. Senator Ferguson gave praise to the directors and to the merchants for their untiring work and for their beautiful exhibits. He hoped that the Federal recognition promised today would turn out to be given. The Island exhibition has been solely the work of Island people. He closed by again congratulating the directors on the magnificent display before him.
