LECTURE AT UNION LOT 33.—Rev. T. F. Fullerton's illustrated lecture at Union Lot 33, Thursday was a decided success. The church was comfortably filled, Rev. T. Hicks, York presiding Rev. W. Spencer, B. A. kindly lent his aid in operating the stereopticon views, and all were more than delighted with the graphic descriptions of the most important men and events of the late South African war. Mr. Fullerton who was received with applause spoke for almost two hours on the salient features of the great campaign. He eulogized the Canadians and especially the P. E. Islanders for bravery and endurance equalled if not excelled by that of the oldest regiments. His defence of Gen. Buller, who was expected to do the impossible, his eulogy of Generals French and Heitor McDonald, his description of the hardships incidental to camp life, and of the various marches and counter marches till Pretoria was reached, of scenes upon the battle fields never to be forgotten, were most eloquently given and received with the greatest enthusiasm. After a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Fullerton and Mr. Spencer, to which they suitably replied, one of the most successful meetings ever held at Union was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.
