James Robson Douglas former Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia and a leading figure in insurance and lumber circles. It had been incorrectly announced that the service would be today. Mrs. Douglas with two of her daughters arrived today from California and with two other daughters who came here from Newton Centre, Mass., with their husbands will accompany the body to Amherst after tomorrow's service. Interment will take place at Amherst, Mr. Douglas died here of pneumonia last night.

Christmas Spirit In Mid-Ocean

(Special to the Guardian) HALIFAX, Dec. 19.—Christmas at sea is always an event of great interest to ocean travellers, no matter what part of the world they may be in, and the festival is punctiliously observed aboard every vessel of the Canadian National Steamships whether in service between Canada and the British West Indies or on the Canada-Australia-New Zealand routes where the turkey dinner and plum pudding are shared by all.

The position of Canadian National Steamship vessels on Christmas Day will be as follows: The "Lady Rodney," with passengers and freight for Jamaica, the Bahama Islands and Bermuda, will spend Christmas in the Port of Halifax and her sister ship, the "Lady Somers," with passengers and cargo from Canada, via Boston, will spend Christmas up to 7 p.m. at Kingston, Jamaica. The "Lady Hawkins" on her southbound voyage for the British West Indies, will spend the forenoon of Christmas Day in Antigua and the afternoon and evening at Montserrat. The "Lady Drake," having called at the various ports of the British West Indies, on her northbound trip, will spend Christmas Day in Saint John, N.B. The "Lady Nelson," on her southbound trip from Halifax, will spend the forenoon of Christmas at the Island of Montserrat and the afternoon and evening at Antigua.

The passenger-carrying freighter "Colborne," with "vagabond cruise" vacationists, will spend Christmas at Demerara, and her sister ship the "Chomedy," southbound from Halifax will spend Christmas day at sea, being due at Bermuda Dec. 26. The freighter "Cathart" northbound from Halifax, will be at sea on Christmas Day, being due at Kingston, Jamaica, December 26, and the "Cavelier," northbound for Halifax, will also spend Christmas at sea, being due at Nassau, the Bahamas. In the Canada-Australia-New Zealand service, the "Canadian Challenger" enroute to Canada, will be in the Pacific at Christmas, the "Canadian Constructor" will spend Christmas at Dunedin, New Zealand and the "Canadian Conqueror" enroute from Canada, will spend Christmas in the Pacific a week out from Panama and the "Canadian Cruiser" from Halifax will then be four days at sea on her way to Australia and New Zealand. The "Canadian Scotian" will spend Christmas in the port of Halifax and the "Canadian Highlander" at Sydney, Australia. The "Canadian Victor" bound for Canada, will be at sea on Christmas day between New Zealand and the Panama and the "Canadian Leader" will spend Christmas in the port of Halifax.
