PRACTICAL ROAD INSPECTORS

Sir,—As I see by the press it is the intention of the government to appoint road inspectors over the road masters. I think if the road inspectors do not know any more about road improvements than the road masters it will be a case of the blind leading the blind. Now the Commissioner of Public Works has full control over the Public Works Department, and is accountable to the taxpayers of this country for the expenditures of the public money. Yet he has no say in the appointment of the officials under him and therefore his hands are effectively tied.

Under these circumstances I would propose that the Inspectors before being appointed stand an examination. If the roads are to be improved in this country it is up to the Commissioner of Public Works to have men appointed who understand building roads. The idea of sending officials over the roads to expend public money over half of whom may not know clay from the north star. This I think is not as it should be. The cement culverts in one or two instances, put throughout the country in the roads are broken up because not set in as they should have been.

NEWSPRINT CONSUMPTION FAR EXCEEDS PRODUCTION IN UNITED STATES.

Consumption of newspaper paper in the United States has increased. Comes from Canada, but small during which period domestic production of the commodity has shown a gain of only 5 per cent., according to a survey of the newspaper paper situation published in the May Commerce Monthly, the magazine of the National Bank of Commerce in New York.
