The many friends of Miss Jessie MacLachlan, the queen of Scottish song, who has appeared in Charlottetown, will regret to learn that she is seriously ill in Auckland, New Zealand, and her recovery is expected.

A number of the prominent men of Charlottetown met in the hall on the 12th inst. and organized the Charlottetown Debating Society. The subject for the 10th inst. is, "Is the Prohibition Law a Benefit or an Injury to the Island?" Visitors cordially invited.

After being on the rocks at Cranberry Head, near North Sydney for several days the Back Diamond liner Coban, Capt. McPhail, arrived in Halifax Friday afternoon about half past one and will undergo repairs here. Considerable damage was sustained by the Coban and a number of plates on her bottom will have to be replaced. The tug D. H. Thomas, towing a barge escorted the Coban here from Sydney—Chronicle. The Coban's chief engineer is well known in this Province.

The schooner W.S. Waycott, Captain Waycott arrived in port Thursday December 6th, with her main boom carried away, broken off short within six inches of a "brake" and about fourteen feet from the jaws. The boom was sixty-six feet, six inches in length and of hard pine. It was repaired and placed together with iron fishing by George L. Sheppard, formerly of Charlottetown, P. E. I., now residing on the Esplanade, and pronounced a splendid piece of work by all who have seen it.—Sydney Post.

The New York Press of the 12th inst. had the following report of a game between the Wanderers of New York and the Yale team. On the Wanderer's team were two boys from this Province, Jimmy Williams, Charlottetown; and Luis Noonan, Summerside. "Yale's hockey team was easy for the Wanderers in the St. Nicholas Rink last night. The Wanderers simply toyed with their opponents and defeated them by a score of 10 goals to three. Notwithstanding that the New Haven boys had several of their star football players in the line up, including Biglow, the local lads were their match at all stages and played them to a standstill.
